Enhancing our borough's history with new town hall

INVESTING IN SERVICES

A historic Grade II listed former hospital building in the heart of London's East End has reopened as Tower Hamlets Council's new town hall

The old Royal London Hospital Building in Whitechapel was built in the mid-eighteenth century, but closed in 2013 when the hospital moved into a new, modern building just next door.

Tower Hamlets Council bought the building for £9m and began a multi-million pound project to restore, renovate and extend the iconic building which will now continue its role of serving the local community.

As well as preserving the listed building, the move to Whitechapel Road provides local people with a permanent, and now more accessible, town hall building, while also saving the council £5m each year in rent for Mulberry Place, which was its Poplar-based town hall building for more than 30 years.

Lutfur Rahman, Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "With so many stories to tell, this is a building which has served local people for centuries and will now continue to do so as the town hall for Tower Hamlets.

"It's a town hall proven to stand the test of time and one we can all take great pride in. "

The relocating of Tower Hamlets Town Hall follows the arrival of the Elizabeth Line to Whitechapel last year. The area is also set to benefit from the multi-million pound Whitechapel Road Improvement Programme and the creation of the new, state-of-the-art Whitechapel

Life Sciences Cluster, supporting 5,000 jobs.

The hospital buildings have been partly retained, including the listed neo-classical façade and clock overlooking Whitechapel Road.

Inside the building, the internal staircases of the hospital and many features of the old chapel have been preserved, while the ceiling lamps and wall-mounted instruments of the old operating theatre have been retained as features in the new chief executive's office.

The entire ground floor is dedicated for public use, with the new town hall boasting a new event and exhibition space, council chamber and a residents' hub so that those who need in-person support can talk to someone face-to-face.

It won't just be council staff working in the building, with staff from Tower Hamlets Homes and NHS clinical commissioning groups also moving in.

Tower Hamlets Council appointed Bouygues to work on designs by Allford Hall Monaghan Morris to renovate, restore and repurpose the old building, including removing significant amounts of asbestos. The work to create the new town hall also created 403 local jobs and 19 apprenticeships.

Moving Tower Hamlets Town Hall to Whitechapel means that the council has bid farewell to its Mulberry Place home. Mulberry will be handed back to the landlord following its closure to the public last month.

Dream come true for Farhana

Assistant project manager Farhana Khan wanted to be an architect since she was a child, but struggled to get into the industry until she started as an apprentice at the council.

She said: "I loved buildings from a young age and always wanted to challenge the norm.

"I didn't always feel supported by my teachers and extended family and when I expressed my ambitions to become an architect, they'd tell me that it would be hard work and too difficult for a young, Bengali woman."

She was forced to put her dreams on hold when at the age of 17, she faced difficult times due to changing personal circumstances that were beyond her control. She started working in retail, until a friend sent her details about apprenticeships available at the council. She applied and got the position in 2008.

She explained: "I hadn't let go of

my ambition to be an architect so I asked to do an apprenticeship with the planning department. I also worked as an apprentice in different departments and learnt so much.

"When the Mayor said he wanted to purchase the historic Royal London Hospital building to turn it into the new town hall, I was in the meeting taking minutes. I remember thinking what a brilliant idea it was.

"I've been completely obsessed with the project since then. When a vacancy came up seven months ago to work as assistant project manager on the project, I applied and got the job.

"I love it. It has been really hard work, but seeing everyone's smiling faces as they see the new town hall for the first time makes it all work it.

"And my six-year-old daughter now really wants to be an architect too which makes me feel so proud."

Legacy for all

Project director Yasmin Ali was born and raised in Tower Hamlets and understands the connection local people have with the building.

She says: "My father died in the Royal London Hospital when I was very young. That is one of my earliest memories of having a connection with the building. I also had my oldest child there, so I understand the important role it has played in the lives and deaths of people in the borough.

"It has been a privilege to be part of the team working on the project, from the design to the construction. There have of course been a lot of complexities with the project, not least from refurbishing a grade II listed building, but also the complications of working through the pandemic. But it has been an amazing experience.

"Mulberry Place wasn't that accessible, but the new town hall is in one of the most accessible parts of London, let alone Tower Hamlets.

"It is not only a great investment for our staff and residents, but also a legacy for them."

Old and new

Charlie Carter started working at Tower Hamlets Council in 2017 as a graduate trainee before being appointed as project manager for the new town hall project in 2019. Alongside this, he has completed an MA in urban design and town planning which the council funded.

He said: "I am really pleased with how well the old mixes with the new in the new town hall. The building has a rich history and we have celebrated that. We have not attempted to hide every imperfection – we are letting it show its scars. The more you play

around with it and attempt to create a pristine building you lose the history which makes it so special.

"We uncovered centuries of history as we stripped the building, including scraps of newspaper from the 1890s in the historic clock face.

"Doing a full-time job with the MA course was intense but it was an amazing opportunity as I wouldn't have been able to fund the course otherwise.

"It has been a super demanding few years, but it is amazing to see all the staff and residents so happy with the new building."

New budget supports future growth for all our residents

Our budget meets our commitment to invest in services and support our residents are at the heart of the council's new budget.

The new budget freezes the Tower Hamlets element of council tax, alongside a 2 per cent Adult Social Care precept to raise \pounds 2.5m towards services for older and vulnerable residents. A \pounds 2.5m package will help provide free homecare for qualifying residents from April 2024.

Tower Hamlets will also retain one of the most generous council tax reduction schemes in the country, with reductions of up to 100 per cent for the borough's low-income families.

Lutfur Rahman, Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "We are proud to have put together our budget which meets our commitment to invest in services and support our residents through this difficult time.

"Our 2023/24 budget is fully costed with significant investment

Safety campaign launched after pest control causes fatal incident

After pest control products caused two fatal or life-changing incidents in the borough, Tower Hamlets Council has launched a campaign to warn residents about the dangers. of professional pest control products.

One incident resulted in the death of an 11-year-old girl, and another left a woman with ongoing serious health issues and no savings after trying to clean up her home.

The council has reported that these incidents are believed to be caused by the use of professional pest control products by untrained residents. The gas from these products can be poisonous and can also lead to explosions and fires.

The campaign, Kill Pests Not People, aims to make sure residents avoid buying pest control products from online marketplaces with multiple sellers, where they can't be sure if the product is suitable for amateur use, and only purchase from reputable UK sellers.

Hamlets, said: "We are shocked added: "Residents need to be by these incidents that have taken cautious when buying pest control place and our thoughts are with chemicals, especially online.

the impacted families. Our primary concern is our residents and ensuring that these incidents don't continue to happen in the borough.

"When people use pest control chemicals that are only meant for professional use or have been shipped in from outside of the UK, they can harm more than just pests."

The council is urging all residents who may have a pest problem to speak to a professional pest control service before trying to tackle the problem themselves.

The Tower Hamlets Council Pest Control Service is an affordable service that has experienced, trained officers and effective treatments and can give advice on how you can stop pests from coming back.

This is echoed by a Tower Hamlets resident who is still suffering headaches, nausea and symptoms, six months after using an insecticide to treat bedbugs, which she bought on eBay from Spain

"Well-known online marketplaces may be reputable but the sellers that are on their platform may not be. If you do need to buy pest control products from an online marketplace you need to make sure that you

research the individual seller. Check that they are UK-based and that their products are not industrial-grade strength."

Council donates abandoned bikes to help upskill Mile End residents

Tower Hamlets Council has donated bikes and cycle parts to Mile End Community Project for use in its project to teach bike mechanic skills to residents.

The council recently launched a project to remove abandoned bikes from the borough's streets.

More than 19 bikes and three bike wheels have been removed as part of the project.

Instead of disposing of the bikes, the council contacted Mile End Community Project, which runs a scheme called On Yer Bike, designed to empower local people with bike mechanic skills and address some of the inequalities in cycling, to see if they could put them to good use.

The team now has an agreement to donate future usable bikes and cycle parts to the charity.

Cllr Maium Talukdar, Deputy Mayor and Cabinet Member for Education and Lifelong Learning, said: "Not only is our bike removal project clearing up our streets of clutter, but by donating the usable cycles we are helping local people to learn and practice new skills.'

Nurull Islam, Founder of Mile End Community Project, said: "This is a great example of what you can achieve when combining resources and collaborative working. On Yer Bike has been running since 2019 and has donated more than 90 bikes to a diverse range of people of all ages."

COST OF LIVING

An extra £190,000 is being invested by Tower Hamlets Council to provide essential supplies to food banks across the borough.

Since the cost-of-living crisis began, many people across the country have been relying on food banks to survive.

The money will go to the Food Hub based in Bethnal Green, which was originally established during the pandemic, and has distributed more than 1,800 tonnes of food - the equivalent of a week's food for more than 45,000 families.

The hub remains a key part of the food support network in the borough and supports more than 60 organisations as well as providing volunteering opportunities for residents who benefit from soft skills on the path to employment.

The funding from the council will be used to buy essential food items in bulk at wholesale prices.

King visits Tower Hamlets

CELEBRATING OUR BOROUGH

Crowds welcomed The King and The Queen Consort to Tower Hamlets as part of a visit to honour the borough's Bangladeshi community.

The visit started at Altab Ali Park in Whitechapel Road. The park is named after the 25-year-old man who was murdered in a racist attack in Adler Street in 1978.

There The King and The Queen Consort met with elders from the community who were involved in the anti-racism movement at the time.

They planted a tree to commemorate the 45th anniversary of Altab's death and visited the Shaheed Minar monument which commemorates the Bengali Language Movement.

Following the park visit, the

procession walked along Brick Lane starting at Banglatown Arch and the adjacent mural.

Both the arch, which was renovated last year, and the 'Mateer Tan/The Land is Calling' mural, which was painted by international artist Mohammed Ali MBE, pay tribute to 50 years of Bangladeshi independence which was celebrated in 2021.

Accompanied by a dance procession, they continued down the famous street, stopping to meet children from a number of local schools, local charities and businesses, and women of the BBPI Jamdani Network.

The visit finished at the Brick Lane Mosque, where they learnt about the history of the building which has changed over the years from a church to a synagogue to the present day mosque.

They met several community and business representatives, including the Brick Lane Funeral Service Director and the President of the East London Central Synagogue, to hear about the devastating impact of the Covid-19 pandemic and interfaith work.

The visit was organised by the British Bangladeshi Power and Inspiration (BBPI), working with Tower Hamlets Council and Tower Hamlets Police.

Ayesha Qureshi MBE JP, Founder of BBPI, said: "Brick Lane is more than just a street to the British Bangladeshi community.

"We are humbled beyond words that Their Majesties The King and The Queen Consort have accepted our invitation to visit the community in our spiritual home of Brick Lane and, in so doing, are recognising the struggles our elders faced in making Britain their home.

"As a community, we have suffered a disproportionate number of deaths during the Covid-19 pandemic.

"We proposed Their Majesties visit as a way for our generation to pay tribute to those we have lost, and on whose shoulders we stand today."

Cllr Shafi Ahmed, Speaker of Tower Hamlets Council, said: "We are incredibly proud to welcome The King and The Queen Consort to our borough.

"We have seen today how much the Royal Family means to our residents, traders and schoolchildren.

"We believe Tower Hamlets offers the best of London in one borough with our mix of culture, communities, entrepreneurship and history.

"Our Bangladeshi community is a example of all of those elements with Brick Lane at the heart."

12 cars impounded for showing stolen blue badges

FIGHTING CRIME

More than 250 blue badges were checked during a day of targeted action in Tower Hamlets.

Blue badges allow those with a disability or health condition to park closer to their destination. However, sadly some people steal blue badges to sell on or use themselves, or they are sometimes used fraudulently.

The council's parking and mobility services and the fraud investigations unit, along with Hamlets Enforcement Tower and Officers (THEOs) Metropolitan Police, carried out a day of checking blue badges across the borough.

During the operation, 25 badges were classed as stolen, and, as a result, 12 cars were impounded.

One badge was being used despite the holder being shown as deceased, and another was past its

A further four badges were being used although they had been reported as lost. The council's fraud investigation service is investigating and will interview all those found to be misusing badges.

Cllr Ohid Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Safer Communities. said: "Blue badge misuse and theft is not a victimless crime.

"Illegally using a badge that isn't yours is denying a disabled parking space to one of the thousands of registered blue badge holders in Tower Hamlets who have a genuine need for them.

"We will continue to carry out blue badge inspections and those who are illegally using a blue badge will be investigated."

Calls for government to bring in tighter restrictions for nitrous oxide use

Nitrous oxide, commonly known as laughing gas or NOX, is a psychoactive substance which can have lasting health issues for commonly used drugs among those who inhale it, including B12 16-24-year-olds deficiency, paralysis and death.

The silver canisters it comes throughout the borough. NOX is often associated with anti-social behaviour.

Nitrous oxide is one of the most in England, according to recent studies.

Cllr Ohid Ahmed, Cabinet under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971. Member for Safer Communities, has been vocal about campaigning for stricter legislation since he took responsibility as cabinet member.

He wrote to Home Secretary Suella Braverman, calling on her to commit to a tough stance on NOX

Cllr Ahmed was pleased to see reports a month after his letter that the government is looking at banning the sale of NOX in England and Wales.

In the letter he wrote: "[NOX] is a particular risk to young people, and, locally, the paediatric team at the Royal London Hospital has identified 30 such cases over the last 12 months.

"When taken with increasing use of NOX amongst young people, the shifting understanding of these health harms should be a cause of concern and a call to action.

Considering the prevalence of abuse of nitrous oxide, its impact on the wider community and potential health harm to young people, we would ask that you continue to press for the ACMD to conduct an updated assessment of the impacts of NOX and whether it should be controlled

"It is the firm belief of Tower Hamlets Council that a stronger stance on NOX use will help to deter users and it is necessary to address the brazen sale and use of NOX that blights our streets."

Tower Hamlets Council has joined forces with the local police to tackle the issue and has recently seized more than 1,000 NOX canisters from local shops in just two days.

The Tower Hamlets Enforcement Officers (THEOs) regularly respond to complaints from residents about NOX and carry out seizures of NOX from people and vehicles.

The council has also introduced a borough-wide Public Spaces Protection Order, meaning people using it in public places can be fined.

However, the council, along with the Local Government Association, is calling for the government to take more action over the selling and use of NOX.

Cllr Ahmed added: "Tower Hamlets Council will continue to seize NOX, fine those selling or using it in Tower Hamlets, and petition the government to bring in tighter restrictions."

Hundreds pledge against gender-based violence during 16 days of activism

Hundreds of people took part in Women's Network and Male Allies, a series of activities and events marking 16 days of activism against gender-based violence.

The council and its partners organised a packed timetable of webinars. awareness sessions and information events from 25 November, which is White Ribbon Day and the UN's International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, to 10 December, Human Rights Day.

White Ribbon Day encourages everyone, including men, to come together to help stop violence against women and girls. It includes signing a pledge to promise to never commit, excuse or remain silent about male violence against women.

Tower Hamlets Council's Violence against Women and Girls (VAWG) and Hate Crime teams, plus the secured 213 pledge signatures almost 50 more than last year.

Lutfur Rahman, Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "One in three women were subjected to at least one form of sexual harassment in the UK in the last year. This is a shocking statistic and we are committed to making Tower Hamlets a safe place for everyone.

"We will continue to emphasise that this is not acceptable in our borough."

Menara Ahmed, the senior VAWG, Domestic Abuse and Hate Crime Manager at Tower Hamlets Council, said: "We really hope these 16 days of activities have opened people's eyes to the range of genderbased violence that happens around the world every day and what action we can all take to help stop it."

"The food we rescue has supported the work of so many amazing community organisations across this great capital city, but, crucially, this is also reducing our damaging impact on planet earth.

"This recognition is certainly well deserved. They are an inspiration to us all at Felix."

Alongside the New Year's Honours, the founder of a Tower Hamlet's-based care provided received a prestigious People's Honour at the House of Lords.

Mohamed Mire was just one of 29 people to be recognised with a British Citizen's Award.

He was recognised at the Palace of

Westminster in recognition of him founding Care Solution Bureau, a culturally sensitive domiciliary care provider in Tower Hamlets.

When Mohamed spotted a gap in the care market for Somali-focused support, he decided to set up his own.

He made a commitment to fully support the Somali community in Tower Hamlets and ensure that the many women in the care sector would no longer experience issues with their pay or a lack of regular work through setting up his care company.

He also provides free English training and job skills support to help the Somali community in Tower Hamlets, such as teaching health and safety.

Afia is Vice Chair of Tower Hamlets Foster Carers' Association (FCA), where she actively supports and mentors other carers and arranges numerous events for carers and children such as trips to the seaside, pantomimes and picnics. She is also helping organise a residential activity trip this summer for the first time.

Her commitment to the FCA has been invaluable and her input into many decisions has tremendously improved the wellbeing of foster carers.

In addition, Afia sits on the Corporate Parenting Board for Tower Hamlets representing foster carers and actively contributing to better working relationships within the department.

The passionate fostering advocate is also an ambassador for Tower Hamlets and regularly supports

recruitment strategies, either standing in a busy supermarket giving out leaflets or answering questions at council information sessions. Not only is Afia well known in our local communities, she also speaks on more national levels and is instrumental in national campaigns.

Afia said: "King Charles pinned my medal on and chatted with me.

"He asked how long I've been fostering and how I find it. He said 'thank you so much for everything you've done'.

"My scroll has the Queen's

"I'm passionate about fostering because there is such a need for caring people to give a child a normal life.

100 laptops delivered to pupils to help tackle the digital divide

ACCELERATE EDUCATION

100 laptops have been donated to pupils to support Tower Hamlets' Connecting Communities project, a cross-sector partnership aimed at tackling the digital divide in the borough. Pupils at Stebon Primary School were the first to receive their laptops.

The laptops were donated by XMA, an IT solutions provider.

The eligible recipient families were identified by local schools who then requested the laptops through the Connecting Communities partnership.

The Connecting Communities partnership was formed in Spring 2020 when the Covid-19 pandemic shone a spotlight on a digital divide and the effects of digital exclusion on low-income communities and vulnerable residents in Tower

Hamlets. The partnership includes Tower Hamlets Council, East End Community Foundation, social housing provider Poplar HARCA and education provider, the Letta Trust. Each partner contributed funding and time to get the project up and running.

The partnership project identifies digitally disadvantaged families to provide children with a laptop and the family with a good digital connection alongside support and training. Families who receive a device are connected to high-speed broadband, which is free for at least 12 months. They also receive a sevenstep training programme to ensure they know how to use their device, to ensure online safety, to enable access to educational resources and their GP and to ensure they know how to manage their finances online.

A total of 358 digital devices have

been distributed to families through the scheme to date, and the laptops from XMA will be distributed over the next month.

With support from partners, the council aspires for every child in the borough to get both the kit and connectivity they need to access online learning.

Jeremy Iver, Headteacher at Stebon Primary School, said: "It's great to be working through Connecting Communities once again in our continued effort to make sure that no child is digitally disadvantaged.

"We're so grateful to XMA for this latest donation of laptops. With the training that comes with them, these machines really do make a huge difference to the families we serve."

Andrew Wright, Commercial Director at XMA, said: "XMA are delighted to have played a small part in supporting Tower Hamlets

Council in making technology accessible to a wider audience. We all have an important part to play in supporting people in any way we can."

Allan Anderson, Head of Grants at East End Community Foundation, said: "The Connecting Communities partnership to close the digital divide has a direct impact on children's education and their whole family's life chances.

"These generously donated laptops, together with a year's free internet access, means children can benefit from all the online educational resources they couldn't access otherwise. We know that teachers see a rapid growth in children's confidence.

"Parents and carers' stress levels are reduced, as it makes booking doctors' appointments, paying bills, accessing benefits and employment opportunities much easier."

Mayflower Primary School in Tower Hamlets has been ranked the best primary school in the country in The Sunday Times Parent Power League Tables 2023.

This follows their success of being named The Sunday Times Primary School of the Year in 2021, and featured in the top three in 2022.

Mayflower achieved the best Standard Assessment Tests (SATS) results amongst all 1,500 state

Mayflower Primary School in Tower surveyed by The Sunday Times Hamlets has been ranked the best across England.

The Sunday Times Parent Power survey analysed the top 250 primary schools across the independent and state sectors in England.

It ranked them by the aggregated average scaled scores achieved by children in reading, grammar and mathematics from SAT tests taken in 2019.

in the top 100 primary schools in Greater London.

Students supported with university costs

The Mayor of Tower Hamlets has officially launched the new University Bursary Award at Queen Mary University.

This will support eligible students with living costs while they are at university.

Eligible students can apply for a £1,500 payment to support with costs associated with their undergraduate studies, including accommodation, books and resources.

The total funding of £600k will

support 400 students in the first

Lutfur Rahman, the Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "This financial support will help give young people the confidence and encouragement to continue their studies amid the cost-of-living crisis.

"Education is very close to my heart and supporting lifelong learning is a priority for my administration.

"It is vital that young people are supported to reach their full

potential and given the tools and opportunities to become the future leaders of the next generation."

The scheme is part of a £1.1m investment to support young people in further education.

It follows the official launch of the Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA), a £400 payment to eligible students to support them with their studies for the 2022/23 academic year.

A funding package of £500k was

announced for the first year of EMA which will support 1,250 students.

Payments for both schemes will be issued directly to the young people.

Applications for the 2022/23 academic year have closed.

- Applications for the 2023/24 academic year will open in Summer 2023.
- They should be submitted on the EMA and University Bursary schemes web page.

Council one of first to pilot government's Family Hubs

ACCELERATE EDUCATION

Tower Hamlets Council is one of the first 75 local authorities to pilot the government's Family Hubs model.

Family Hubs, a government initiative, provide a single point of access to a range of different services for families both online and in person.

Services are delivered for children from birth until they reach the age of 19, or 25 for young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

The pilot has kick-started in Stepney, Wapping, Whitechapel, Limehouse and Shadwell. It involves the following Children and Family Centres:

- John Smith Children and Family Centre, E1 2EN
- Ocean Children and Family Centre, E1 oND

- Ocean Children and Family Centre (Shadwell site), E1 oAF
- Wapping and Bigland Children and Family Centre, E1 2JP

The council's new Early Help Strategy, launched in January 2023, will be delivered through the Family Hubs model. During the pilot the council will also look at co-locating services and delivering from partner organisation locations.

Following the pilot's completion in May, a full Family Hubs network will be rolled out by March 2024.

Cllr Maium Talukdar, Deputy Mayor of Tower Hamlets and Cabinet Member for Education, Youth and Lifelong Learning, said: "The Family Hubs pilot is a really exciting scheme that will improve accessibility to services for families in the borough. I am grateful to our staff and our partners for continually working to support our families and children."

About 80.000 bulbs including snowdrops, narcissus, alliums, crocus, muscari, anemone and botanical tulips were planted in each park. They will bloom from early spring and through summer.

Free market parking for all

Residents can book their slot by phoning 020 3046 0010 or by downloading the RingGo app on their phone. Residents can then choose to extend their stay by paying for parking if they wish.


Alongside this, the council is also changing resident parking in the borough.

Instead of having a number of small parking zones, those with resident parking permits will be able to park in one of four larger areas for free. For example, if you live in zone B, you will be able to park in all of zone B.

This will make it easier for people to find a space to park in the borough.

You will not need to reapply for a parking permit as the update will be made automatically.

recently launched in the borough.


It is a £7.6 million government initiative from the Department of Work and Pensions that will help more than 2,000 adults across 24 local authorities with learning disabilities and autism into work.

Taking on street litter and grime

CLEAN AND GREEN

A new team will focus on making the streets of Tower Hamlets cleaner and greener.

Acting as liaison between the community and the council, the environmental coordinators will be out on the streets talking and listening to residents and recommending improvements.

They will also work to keep litter and dumped waste off the streets, as well as hosting clean-ups and educational events.

This is part of the council's yearlong programme to address the issue of street waste, including improving our refuse areas and working with the community to highlight the litter issue.

The programme follows a trial

event that took place on Saturday 8 October where volunteers, including local businesses, organisations and residents, got together to deep clean Bethnal Green.

The volunteers, which included members of the local litter-picking group, WaSH Wombles, and Bethnal Green McDonald's, cleared approximately 25 bags of street litter at the event.

There was also an event on Saturday 3 December in Middleton Green Park dedicated to tidying Old Bethnal Green Road.

Cllr Kabir Hussain, Cabinet Member for Environment and the Climate Emergency, said: "We know some of our streets are too dirty and that is why the Mayor of Tower Hamlets has declared a waste emergency.

"Tower Hamlets is our home

- we want everyone to be proud to live here and to enjoy a clean environment."

Paul Kellaway, WaSH Wombles, said: "As a volunteer litter-picker, it's fantastic to see the council getting out on the streets to speak to residents.

"While the council has the job of cleaning up the streets, we need to recognise that businesses, residents and visitors have a role to play in changing our behaviours to reduce the amount of rubbish being left on the street in the first place."

New electric bin lorry is driving down our emissions

One waste and recycling collection route in Tower Hamlets is now 70 per cent greener due to the introduction of our first fully electric bin lorry.

As part of the council's commitment to the climate emergency, we are providing a £4million investment to replace some of our existing fleet of diesel and petrol cars, vans and scooters over the next three years.

There is an additional investment of £900,000 to provide charging infrastructure across the borough for council vehicles which will deliver fast-charging and increase the efficiency of our vehicles.

As well as the important environmental impact of cutting emissions, the electric vehicle is approximately twice as cheap to run compared to the old diesel vehicle,

meaning it is more efficient and cost-effective.

The vehicle is charged overnight and can run on full charge for two days.

Cllr Kabir Hussain, Cabinet Member for Environment and the Climate Emergency, said: "The introduction of this new electric bin lorry is the first step to a greener fleet that delivers for residents in keeping the borough clean, while protecting the quality of our air and natural environment.

"We look forward to welcoming another electric vehicle this year, along with investments for other vehicles in the fleet and the electric charging infrastructure necessary to sustain these changes."

Housing management services will be brought in-house soon

HOMES FOR THE FUTURE

Housing services currently managed by Tower Hamlets Homes (THH) are set to be transferred to Tower Hamlets Council.

A timetable for the transition will be developed over the coming months, in discussion with Tower Hamlets Council, THH, staff and stakeholders, with the aim of

completing the move by the end of this year.

Tenants and leaseholders do not need to do anything and will continue to access their services in the same way. The change does not affect tenancy and leasehold agreements.

The decision, subject to a fiveday call-in period, was agreed at a Cabinet meeting on Wednesday 22 February. THH was set up in 2008 to allow the borough to qualify for the government's Decent Homes fund, which ended in 2017.

Aims of bringing services back in-house include: to help join-up housing and other council services to make it easier for residents to get what they need; to give residents a strong voice into the council to help improve standards; to ensure the council is closer to critical issues such as fire and building safety; and to provide services for the best value.

More than 86 per cent of council tenants and leaseholders who took part in a consultation, agreed that housing management services should be brought back in house.

Get mould under control this spring

With a cold winter and increased heating costs, you might have had issues with mould in your home this winter.

Mould is caused by condensation and can lead to coughing, wheezing and watering eyes.

Long term exposure to mould may lead to serious respiratory problems for people with underlying health conditions, young children and the elderly.

Cllr Kabir Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Regeneration, Inclusive Development and Housebuilding, said: "We are cracking down on private and social landlords who are not doing enough to prevent mould developing in their properties for their tenants.

"This includes inspections, with or without a complaint from tenants, before granting or renewing their licence.

"We want all homes in Tower Hamlets to be free from damp and mould."

Aside from mould caused by structural problems, there are some things all residents can do to help prevent condensation and mould where they live, and now is a great time to have a spring clean and clear any mouldy surfaces to prevent the mould from getting worse.

- · Dry your windows and window sills every morning
- · Ventilate your home by opening windows about 5cm to 10cm for about half an hour every day
- If possible, heat your home to at least 18C
- Allow space for air to circulate around furniture including behind wardrobes
- Don't dry laundry on radiators. Instead place it in the bathroom with the door closed and windows open.

How to clean mould

- Wipe down walls and window frames with a mould and mildew cleaner or fungicidal spray, available in supermarkets. Always follow the instructions exactly
- Do not try to remove the mould patch by dusting it as this can disturb and spread mould spores into the air
- After cleaning, you can redecorate using a good quality anti-mould or fungicidal paint to help prevent regrowth
- If wallpapering, use a paste containing a fungicide to prevent further mould growth

Tower Hamlets is one of few boroughs which is 'improving'

CELEBRATING OUR BOROUGH

Tower Hamlets is one of just four areas in the country which residents think is improving, a recent survey has shown.

Data company YouGov asked people living in the areas that have been targeted by the government's Levelling Up funding whether they thought their area had improved, stayed the same, or declined, since the funding.

Residents in only four places in the

country responded that their town was better – and one of those was Tower Hamlets, where 34 per cent of residents said they thought the borough had improved.

A total of 51 per cent of Tower Hamlets residents also said that the borough was somewhere to move to, not move away from.

Lutfur Rahman, Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "It is fantastic to see that our residents are already feeling the positive impact of the hard work we are doing to make Tower Hamlets the best place to live, work, and visit. "We have invested the government's Levelling Up funding carefully to ensure it reaches as many residents as possible.

"However, we know there is still a long way to go, and this is only the beginning.

"We have an ambitious programme to improve the crime rate, education, housing, sustainability, culture and businesses in the borough to ensure all of our residents are supported to reach their full potential."

Tower Hamlets Council has invested the £9.3m from the

government's Levelling Up funding to support the delivery of the Whitechapel Road Improvement Programme (WRIP).

This will see street improvements such as better pavements, and more signage and seating, as well as upgrades to market stalls and essential repairs to properties along the high street.

The other three boroughs which residents thought had improved were Hackney (38 per cent) and Islington and Southwark (both 36 per cent).

New government legislation means that from 4 May 2023, all voters will need to show photo ID when voting in person at polls.

This includes

parliament

by-elections, local elections in England and, from October 2023, general elections.

Accepted photo ID includes a photocard driving licence, a passport issued by the UK, EU, Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein or a Commonwealth country, a Defence

Identity card, and a PASS card. You can see a full list on the government website below.

Those who do not have the legally prescribed photographic ID can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate as proof of their ID.

Eateries, including chicken shops and takeaways, which are helping people make healthier choices are being celebrated.

The Tower Hamlets Food for Health Awards recognises those cafes, restaurants, takeaways, staff canteens and market traders that have made changes to the way they cook and serve food to provide healthy alternatives.

Created in 2010, the council started working with local businesses to ensure their health and safety standards were up to scratch, alongside suggesting subtle, healthier changes such as using thicker chips, offering salads or incorporating vegetarian options.

James and Karen Patterson from Maureen's Pie and Mash Shop in Chrisp Street Market contacted their supplier about getting a healthier alternative for their pies and offering a vegetarian option. James said: "Years ago, you wouldn't have dreamed of doing a veggie pie but it does work!"

Selima and her husband, from Mile End Original Fried Chicken, benefitted from free food hygiene training and a nutritional course by taking part in the award programme.

She said: "We started making small changes such as offering grilled food, cutting down portion sizes and introducing salads."

Chloe, from the Breakhouse Café, said: "I decided to sign up to the

Food for Health Awards because, as a small, young business, it's always good to have support from the council.

"The changes we made were things like not having the salt out, rearranging the shelves, making sure we had sugar-free options and having water in a visible place."

Businesses receive free food safety and hygiene training when they sign up.

Our history through your eyes: Dennis remembers growing up in Stepney Green

CELEBRATING OUR BOROUGH

Think of the East End of London, and you might think of its history, culture, opportunity and community, which is best told through its residents. Dennis Reece, 91, recalls his memories of growing up in Stepney Green.

"We used to stand outside the train station and watch the aerial dog fights between British and German planes going on over the city," Dennis remembers.

He was just eight when the Second World War broke out, but he still vividly remembers living during the 1940s in Stepney Green.

"My father didn't want to separate the family, so we weren't evacuated and we lived in our house throughout the war," Dennis continues.

"When there was an air raid, most people used to use the underground stations to take shelter, but we were fortunate to have an Anderson shelter, which was a metal structure you put about five or six feet underground, in our garden.

"The shelter was quite cramped, but we used to fit me, my parents, my brother and my sister in there. We were lucky that dad ran an electric cable to the shelter so we had a dim lightbulb and heating.

"I used to spend most of my time collecting shrapnel from the streets after air raids. We used to watch the dog fights going on over the city as it was only a mile away. I remember my father shouting with glee, "that was one of them! We got one down", but I said to my dad, "sorry, it was actually a Spitfire"."

Sometimes the fighting got too close to home for Dennis and his family.

He said: "We had a garage next door to us which had an incendiary device dropped on it. We had to wait at the end of the road while the fire service put it out.

"I remember that was the most distressing time of my life. I was only 12."

Dennis says his family was very lucky their house wasn't destroyed during the Blitz as he remembers playing in the rubble of many houses near to his which were bombed.

Dennis, who worked at the Tate and Lyle sugar refinery after leaving school, grew up in Alderney Road,

Stepney Green, and affectionately remembers his house and family.

He said: "The house was two storeys with an attic and a cellar. We lived downstairs and there were two rooms - a front room and a bedroom. We had one cold water tap in the scullery - what you would now call a kitchen. That was all you had by way of water and it had to be boiled before it could be used.

"We had one toilet outside shared between us and the people upstairs.

"That house now is probably worth more than a million pounds."

Dennis recollects the coal delivery which would be emptied into the cellar and it was his and his siblings' job to sort the coal into piles for his family and for the other family which lived upstairs.

He also recalls buying eels from the markets near his house. The live eels would be chopped up and the bits would still be wiggling in the bag as they were taken home.

His family life was a happy one and he remembers vividly the parties his parents would arrange. His father, a gifted pianist, would play all night while the family would have a 'kneesup mother brown'.

Dennis adds: "To this day I am so sorry I never bothered to ask my father how he learnt to play the piano as he couldn't read a note of music. But he could play it."

Music was an important part of his family's life and Dennis has fond memories of listening to traditional jazz music in the Number I Jazz Club with his brother and sister, and later with his now wife, Mary.

He also remembers Queen Elizabeth II's coronation in 1953 and sitting with Mary on the pavement in Cockspur Street for two days and a night waiting for the coronation.

He explained: "While we were waiting for the coronation procession, we had students next to us who sang and played the guitar. It was like the queue to see Queen Elizabeth II lying in state - you made friends with those near you."

third base at 400 Old Ford Road next to the Lord Morpeth pub. Opened in 1914 on her 32nd birthday, this was also Sylvia's home, the Women's Hall, site of the cost price restaurant and information bureau.

It closed in 1924 when Sylvia relocated to Essex and has since been demolished, but a mural unveiled in 2018 depicts Sylvia in characteristic poses.

Rachel explains: "It is partly thanks to the work of Sylvia, and others across the country, that women were given partial voting rights in a new government act in 1918, only gaining the same rights as men in 1928.

"These women were trailblazers of their generation."

Sylvia moved to Ethiopia in 1956 through her friendship with Haile Selassie, where she died. Her grave is in Addis Ababa.






নতুন বাজেট সম্পর্কে নির্বাহী মেয়র লুৎফুর রহমান বলেছেন, "আমরা আমাদের প্রথম বাজেট পেশ করতে পেরে গর্বিত। এই বাজেট কাউন্সিলের সার্ভিসগুলোতে বিনিয়োগ করার এবং চলমান কঠিন সময়ে আমাদের বাসিন্দাদের সহায়তা করার প্রতিশ্রুতি পূরণ করে। আমরা কাউন্সিল ট্যাক্স বাড়াছি না এবং লন্ডনের সবচেয়ে কম হারের কাউন্সিল ট্যাক্স রয়েছে এমন হাতে গোনা কয়েকটি বারার মধ্যে অন্যতম একটি হওয়ার ধারা আমরা অব্যাহত রেখেছি।"

বারার তরুণদের উচ্চ শিক্ষা লাভে সহায়তা করার জন্য মেয়রের ইউনিভার্সিটি বার্সারি এওয়ার্ড নামের আর্থিক প্রণোদনা কর্মসূচি আনুষ্ঠানিকভাবে চালু করেছে কাউপিল।

৩০ জানুয়ারী সোমবার, পূর্ব লন্ডনের মাইল এন্ড রোডে অবস্থিত কুইন মেরি ইউনিভার্সিটিতে আয়োজিত এক অনুষ্ঠানে বারার নির্বাহী মেয়র লুৎফুর রহমান আনুষ্ঠানিকভাবে মেয়র'স্ ইউনিভার্সিটি বার্সারি ক্ষিমটি চালু করেন। কুইন মেরি ইউনিভার্সিটির সার্বিক ব্যবস্থাপনায় আয়োজিত অনুষ্ঠানে ইউনিভার্সিটির প্রেসিডেন্ট এন্ড প্রিপিগাল প্রফেসর কলিন বেইলি, টাওয়ার হ্যামলেটস কাউন্সিলের কর্পোরেট ডিরেক্টর ফর চিলড্রেন্স সার্ভিসেস জেমস টমাস সহ কাউন্সিলের শীর্ষস্থানীয় কর্মকতাবৃন্দ, বিশিষ্ট শিক্ষাবিদ ও শিক্ষা গবেষকগণ ও শিক্ষার্থীরা উপস্থিত ছিলেন। অনুষ্ঠানটি পরিচালনা করেন হেড অব মেয়র অফিস, এ্যামি জ্যাকসন।

মেয়রের ইউনিভার্সিটি বার্সারি অ্যাওয়ার্ড পাওয়ার যোগ্য বিবেচিত শিক্ষার্থীদের বিশেষ এই আর্থিক প্রণোদনা বিশ্ববিদ্যালয়ে অধ্যয়নে ব্যয় নির্বাহের ক্ষেত্রে কিছুটা সহায়তা করবে। যোগ্য শিক্ষার্থীরা আবাসন, বই এবং আনুষাঙ্গিক সংস্থান বা রিসোর্সেস সহ তাদের স্লাতক অধ্যয়নের সাথে সম্পর্কিত খাতে ব্যয় করার জন্য এককালীন ১,৫০০ পাউন্ড অনুদান চেয়ে আবেদন করতে পারেন। এই খাতে বরাদ্দকৃত ৬ লাখ পাউন্ডের তহবিল দিয়ে প্রথম বছরে প্রায় ৪০০ শিক্ষার্থীকে সহায়তা দেয়া হবে।

এই তহবিল হচ্ছে বারার তরুণদেরকে আরও বেশি জীবনমুখি সুযোগ পেতে সহায়তা করার জন্য মেয়র লুংফুর রহমানের দেয়া প্রতিশ্রুতির অংশ। জীবনযাত্রার ব্যয় বৃদ্ধির ফলে পারিবারিক বাজেটের ওপর অভৃতপূর্ব চাপ সৃষ্টির চলমান কঠিন সময়ে এই সহায়তাগুলি বিশেষভাবে গুরুত্বপূর্ণ।

এ প্রসঙ্গে মেয়র লুৎফুর রহমান বলেন, "আমি আনুষ্ঠানিকভাবে বিশ্ববিদ্যালয় বার্সারি স্কিম চালু করতে পেরে আনন্দিত। এই স্কিম তরুণদের উচ্চতর শিক্ষা গ্রহনের ক্ষেত্রে আর্থিক চ্যালেঞ্জ্ঞলি ব্রাস করতে সহায়তা করবে। এই আর্থিক সহায়তা যুবকদের জীবনধারণের সংকটের মধ্যেও পড়াশোনা চালিয়ে যেতে আত্মবিশ্বাস ও উৎসাহ যোগাবে।"

তিনি বলেন, "শিক্ষা আমার হৃদয়ের খুব কাছাকাছি এবং জীবনমুখি শিক্ষাকে সহায়তা করা আমার প্রশাসনের জন্য একটি অন্যতম অগ্রাধিকার। তরুণদেরকে তাদের পূর্ণ সম্ভাবনায় পৌঁছানোর জন্য এবং পরবর্তী প্রজন্মকে নেতৃত্ব দেয়ার মত যোগ্য হওয়ার উপযোগী সরঞ্জাম এবং সুযোগগুলি প্রদান করা খুবই জরুরী।"

এডুকেশন এন্ড লাইফলং লার্নিং বিষয়ক কেবিনেট মেমার, কাউপিলর মাইয়ুম তালুকদার বলেন, "প্রতিটি তরুণ তাদের আর্থিক পরিস্থিতি নির্বিশেষে সর্বোত্তম শিক্ষার সুযোগ পাওয়ার দাবিদার। টাওয়ার হ্যামলেটসের তরুণদের সাহায্য করার জন্য কাউপিলের প্রতিশ্রুতির বাস্তব প্রতিফলন হচ্ছে মেয়রের ইউনিভার্সিটি বার্সারি ক্ষিম। আর এটি এমন সময়ে নেয়া হয়েছে, যখন অনেক পরিবার আর্থিক সংকটের সাথে লডাই করে চলেছে।"


