The detail in the analysis is the latest available at the time of publication and will be updated when more up to date information of a significant nature is available.



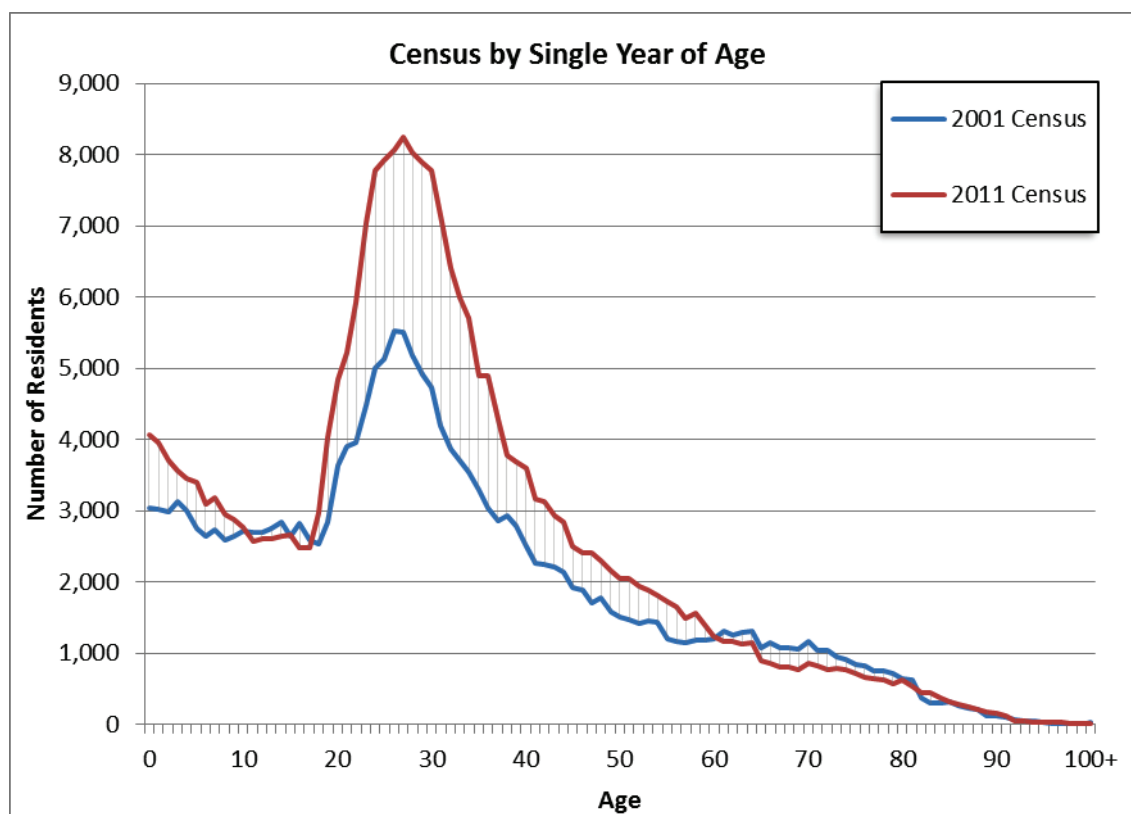
## Population

### Population – general population

The Greater London Authority (GLA) Population Projections place the current population of Tower Hamlets at 266,100<sup>1</sup> residents.

LBTH experienced the highest growth rate between the 2001 Census to the 2011 Census across all of England and Wales. Growth exceeded 29% over this period, with the increases concentrated in the younger working age population (ages 25 to 39), though there were also increases in 40 to 60 age group and those aged under 10.

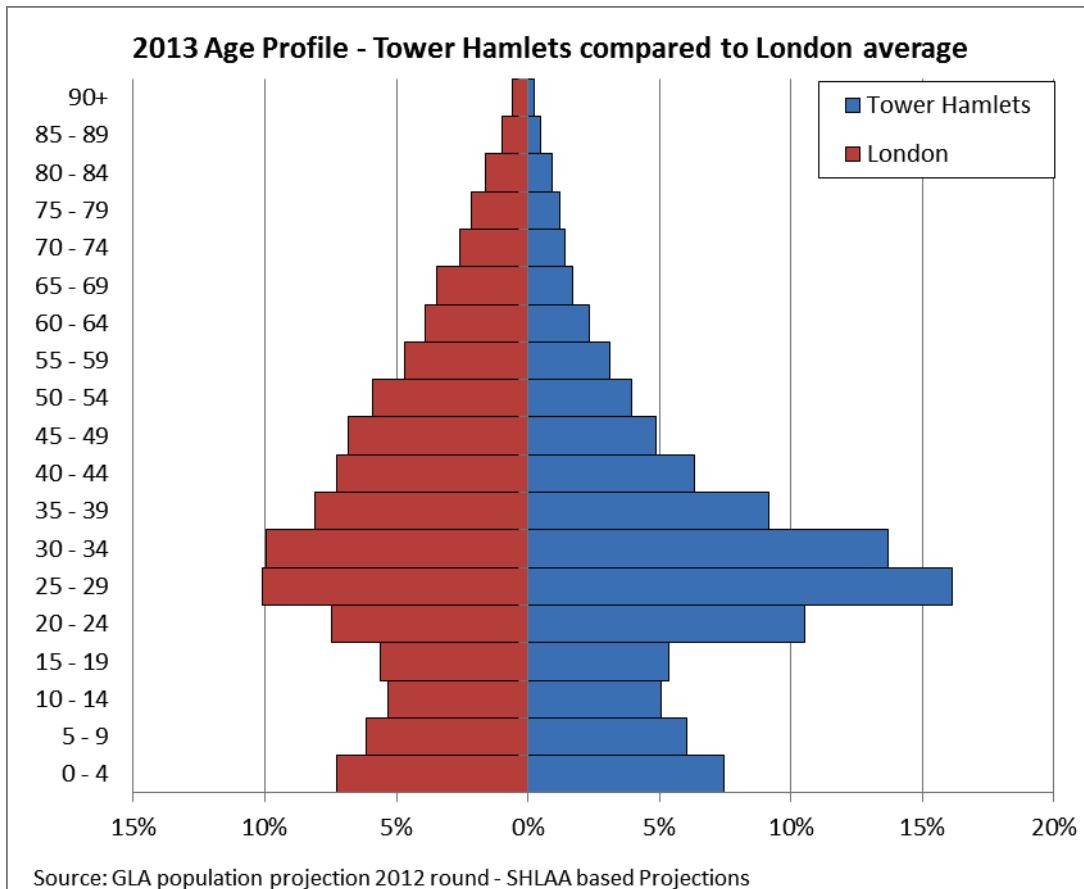
**Chart 1. Change in population from 2001 Census to 2011 Census**

## Population – older residents – trends 2001 - 2011<sup>2</sup>

- The number of residents aged over 65 in Tower Hamlets fell from 18,362 in the 2001 Census to 15,500 in 2011. This is a reduction of 15.6% (2,862 residents), the largest in London except for Barking & Dagenham.
- The borough followed the national and London trends in having more women than men in the older age groups (over 65) with women outnumbering men by 2 to 1 for those aged 90+ (compared with 2.6 to 1 for London) reflecting gender differences in average life expectancy.
- In the older population aged 65+, London showed significantly lower growth (1.5%) than nationally (10.9%), however, both Inner London and the Olympics host boroughs saw decreases of -2.3% and -8.7% respectively. The change in this age group reflected the direction of change in Tower Hamlets, though this was more marked with the over 65 population reducing by 15.6% (2,862 residents).
- Within the over 65 age group, LBTH saw reductions in those aged 65 to 79 of 3,164 residents (a fall of 21.9%), but an increase in those aged over 80 which increased by 302 residents (an increase of 7.7%).

- Within the over 65 cohort, LBTH did diverge from the Inner London and Olympics host borough trends. The number of those aged 65 to 79 reduced by 3.5% in Inner London and by 10.9% in the host boroughs, but Tower Hamlets saw a significantly greater reduction of 21.9% (3,164 residents). This contrasts with the figures for those over 80, where LBTH actually saw an increase of 302 residents (+7.7%) compared with growth of 1.32% in Inner London and a reduction across the host boroughs of 2.4%.

## Population - older residents – population projections

Over the next nearly 20 years, the GLA predicts that the increase of population will grow by 30% from 266,100 (in 2013) to 345,400 (in 2030), an increase of 79,200 people. The greatest increase (57,600) is expected in the population aged 18 – 64 years, with an anticipated increase of 30% (note people aged 90+ will increase by 157%, from 600 to 1,700).

The table below shows a rise in population for all age groups over 65 by 2030. The rise in population for the oldest elderly is much steeper than for other age groups; this population is most likely to be in need of social care services.

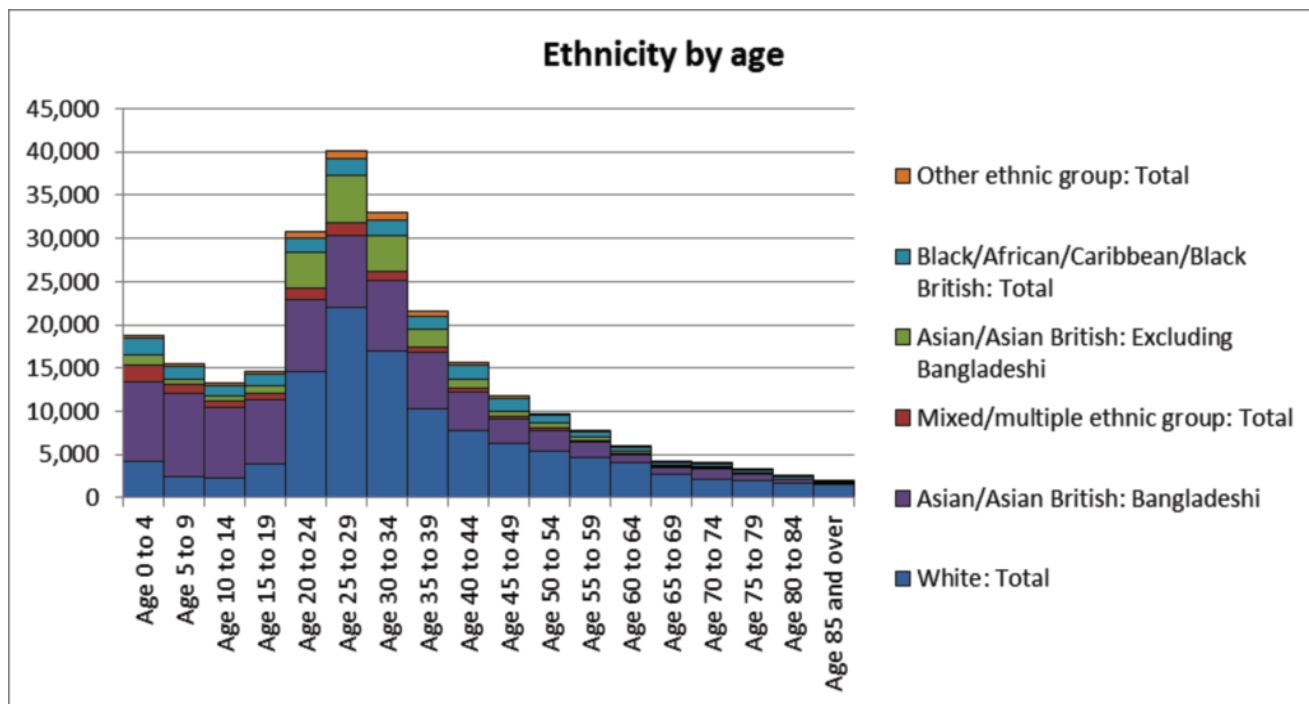

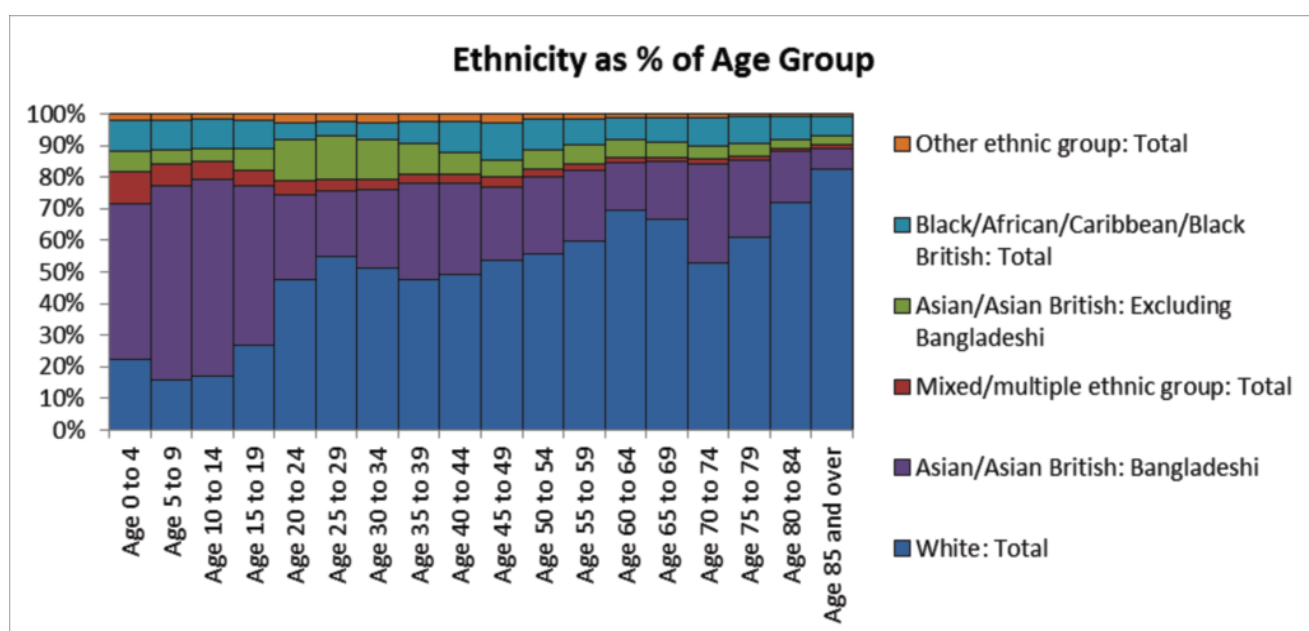
The chart below shows the variation in ethnicity by age.

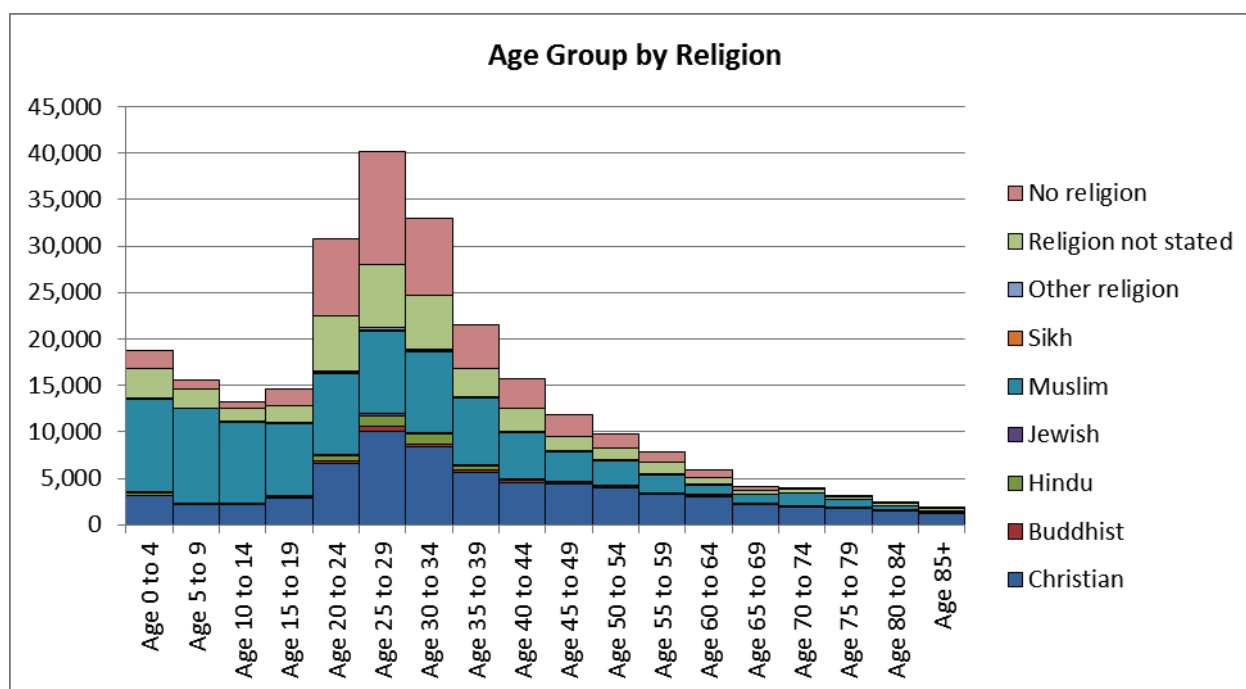
## Religion

Tower Hamlets has the highest percentage of Muslim residents in England – 35% compared with a national average of 5%. Conversely, the borough has the lowest proportion of Christian residents in England: 27% compared with a national average of 59%.

Since 2001, the most significant changes in the borough's faith profile include a fall in the proportion of Christian residents (39 to 27%) and a rise in the percentage with no religion (14 to 19%) – these changes reflect national trends over the same period. In Tower Hamlets, there was also a rise in the percentage who did not state their religion from 7 to 15%. The proportion of Muslim residents has shown little change over the period (36 vs. 35%).<sup>4</sup>

The 2011 Census recorded the proportion of Christian residents generally increasing in the older age ranges. For the 1,790 residents aged 85+, almost 70% are Christian. The next largest proportion, 12%, did not state their religion, whilst 9% are Muslim.

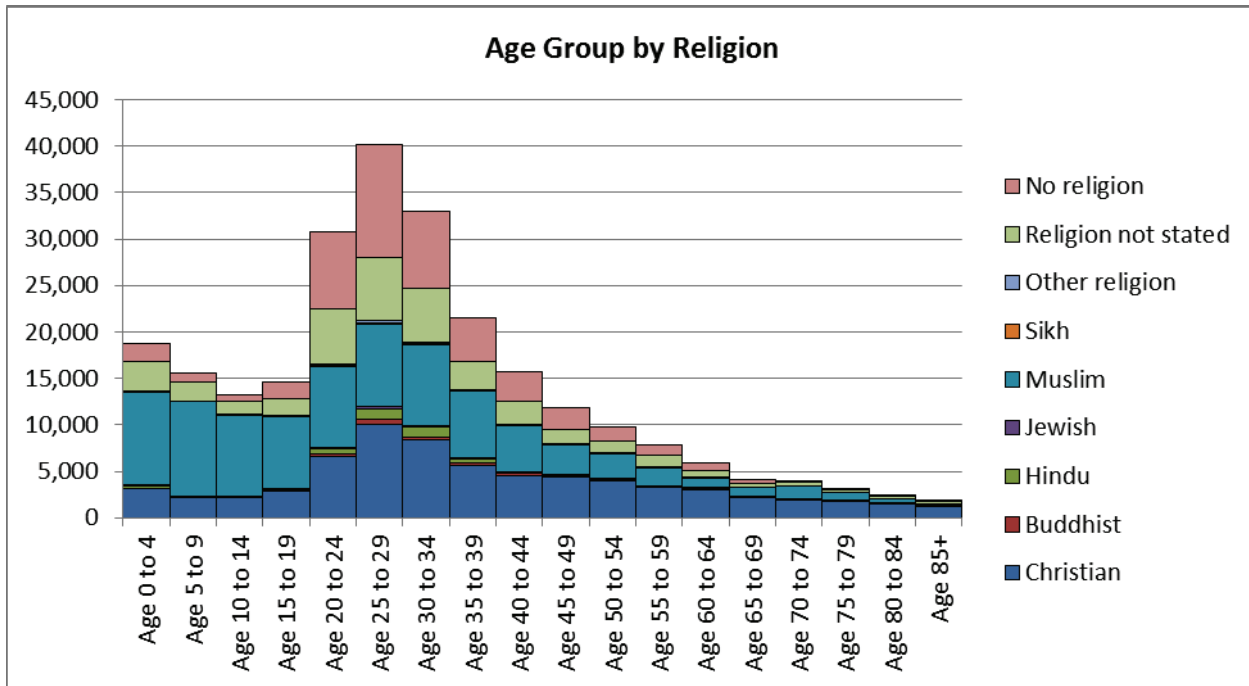
**Chart 5. Age group by religion**

## Language<sup>5</sup>

The Census records information about the main language used by residents – which is intended to capture a person's first or preferred language. In Tower Hamlets, English and Bengali are the two most commonly used main (first or preferred) languages: **two thirds (66%) of residents use English as their main language and 18% use Bengali** (which includes Sylheti and Chatgaya).

The remaining 16% of residents cite a wide variety of other European and international languages. After English and Bengali, the largest language groups in Tower Hamlets are: Chinese, French, Spanish, Italian and Somali – each used by between 1-2% of the population. In total, **the Census identifies at least 90 different languages (or groups of languages) being used in the borough.**

Tower Hamlets has a relatively high proportion of residents who use a main language other than English: 34% compared with 22% across London and 8% nationally – **the third highest percentage in England**, after both Newham and Brent.

In Tower Hamlets, **117 residents used sign language**, 91 of whom used British Sign Language.

**Tower Hamlets is the 4th most linguistically diverse area in England and Wales.**

Tower Hamlets remains unique with regard to its high proportion of Bengali speakers - 18% compared with 3% across Inner London and less than 1% nationally. **Tower Hamlets has the largest number, and proportion of, Bengali speakers in England.**

The proportion of residents who cite Bengali as their main language is lower than the proportion of the population that are ethnically Bangladeshi (18 vs. 32%) - indicating that **many Bangladeshi residents use either English, or another (non-Bengali) language, as their main language.**

Tower Hamlets ranks highly on the size of its Chinese speaking population. Considered together, residents using Chinese languages comprise 1.7% of the borough's population – the third highest proportion in England.

Among those whose main language was not English the majority (77%) said they could speak English *well* or *very well* and just under one quarter said they have low or no proficiency in spoken English. So while Tower Hamlets has a relatively high proportion of residents using languages other than English, the proficiency data show that **the majority of this group are also fluent in English, highlighting the significant number of bi-lingual residents in the borough.**

When expressed as a proportion of the whole population, the percentage of the Tower Hamlets population who have poor (or no) fluency in spoken English is 8% – around one in 12 residents – which is the second highest proportion nationally after Newham (9%). This compares with 4% across London and 2% in England.

The proportion of residents who report low levels of, or no, proficiency in spoken English ranges from 4% in Bow East and Millwall wards up to **11% in the wards of Bethnal Green South, Bromley-by-Bow and Spitalfields & Banglatown.**

Statistics linking language with age are not available. This information will be added to the Market Position Statement in due course.

## Life Expectancy

- The average life expectancy at birth for males in Tower Hamlets born between 2006 and 2010 is currently 76.3 years, and for females it is 80 years, which is lower than the national average of 78.3 years for men and 82.1 years for women.<sup>6</sup>
- Although life expectancy in the borough is below that for the UK, this masks substantial differences between the wards. For males in Bow East and St Dunstons and Stepney Green ward life expectancy at birth over 2006-2010 was 72.3 and 72 years. The corresponding figure for Spitalfields and Banglatown ward was 83.2 years.
- The figures for females show life expectancy falling as low as 78.8 years in Bethnal Green North ward to as high as 94.8 years in Millwall ward. (next highest is 88.6 in Bethnal Green South).

Figure 1: Proportion of population estimates per ward of people age 65+ (2011)

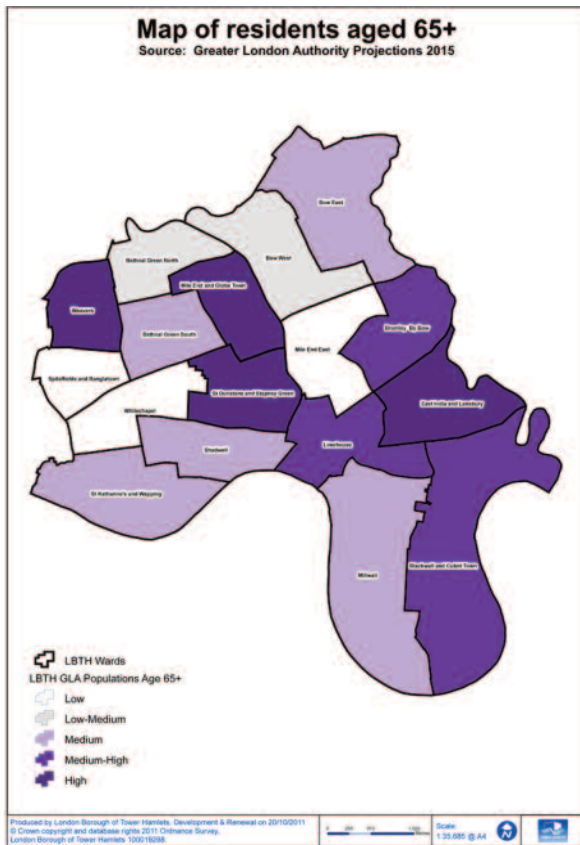
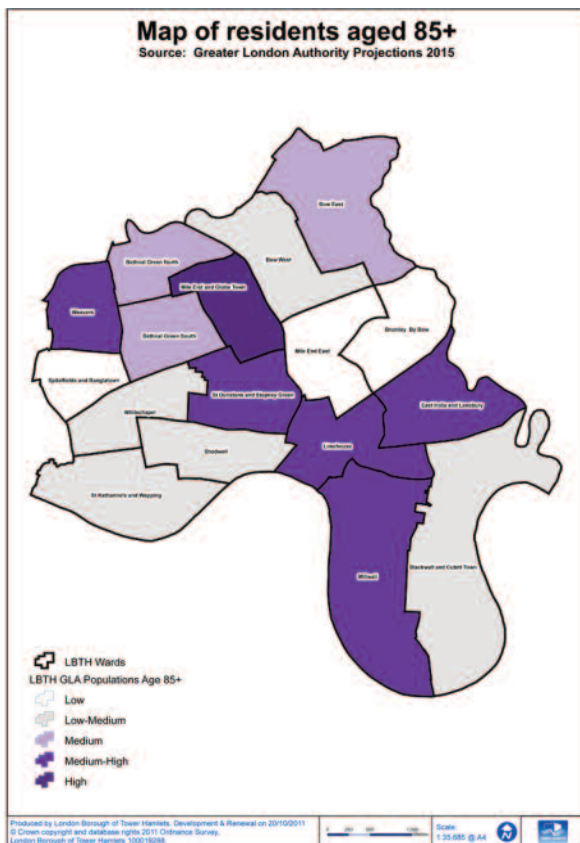
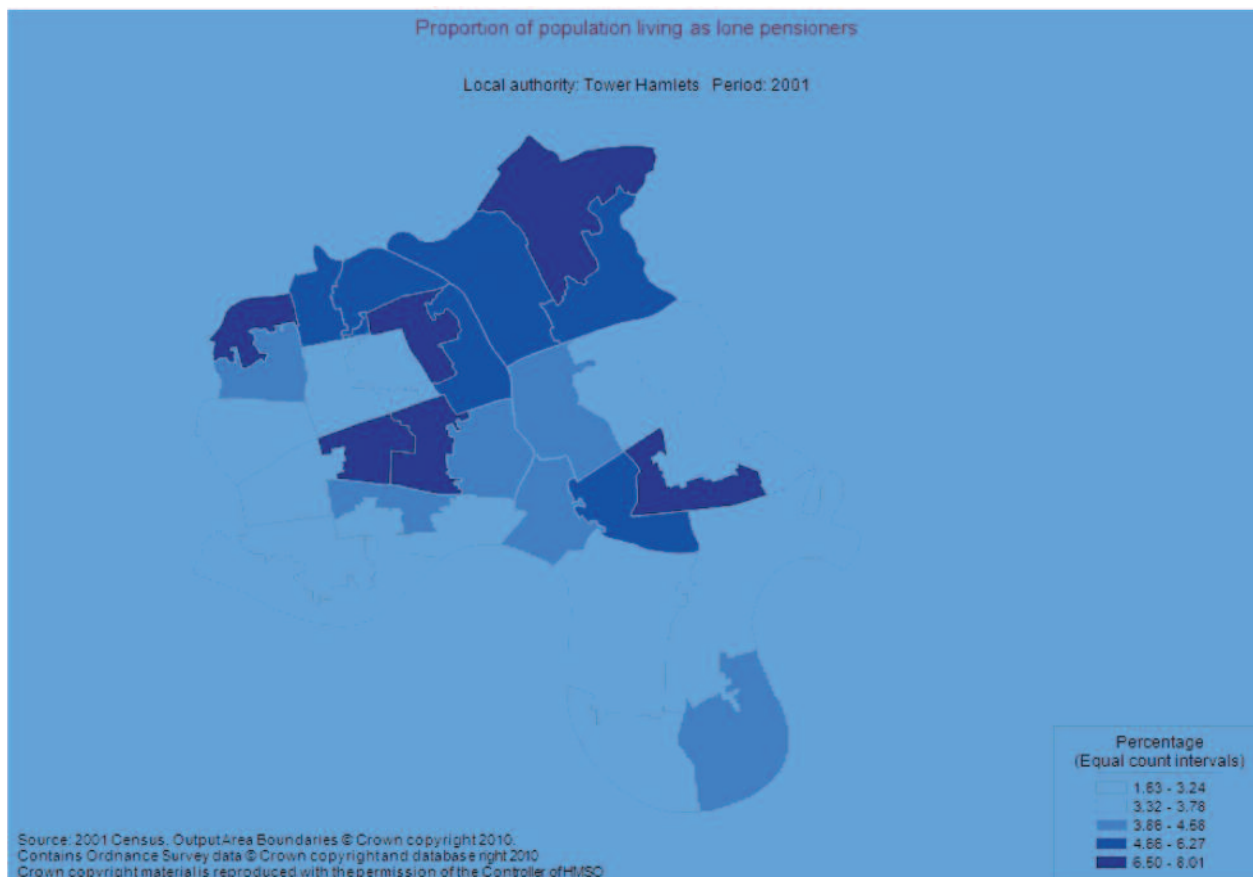


Figure 2. Proportion of population estimates per ward of people age 85+ (2011)

## Households with a long-term health problem or disability<sup>10</sup>

The majority of residents (83%) in Tower Hamlets reported that they either had very good or good health. This is just below the percentage for London (84%) and just above the percentage for England (82%).

However, 20,840 households in the borough (20.6%) contain at least one person with a long-term health problem or disability, a lower proportion than in London (22.4%) and England (25.7%).

Of these households 5,742 (27.6%) also have dependent children, a higher proportion than in London (22.3%) and England (18.0%). The proportion of households with no dependent children, and that have one person with a long-term health problem or disability is 14.9%. This is lower than London 17.4% and England 21%.

More residents in Tower Hamlets than nationally said that their day to day activities were not limited by a long term health problem or disability. In Tower Hamlets 65% said that was the case compared to 65% in London and 56% nationally. This is a function of the age profile of the borough which has a higher proportion of younger residents. The rates per 1,000 residents by age band show that older groups do tend to have worse outcomes on this measure when compared with London and England.

People aged 65 and over are more likely to report a limiting illness or disability in Tower Hamlets (651 per 1,000) than London or England (53 per 1,000).

In response to the question about long term health problem or disability, 11% of the working age population in Tower Hamlets said that they had a long term health problem or disability, compared to 13% nationally. A number of London boroughs have seen a significant improvement in the incidence of long term health problems amongst residents. Whilst Tower Hamlets had the largest decrease (improvement), there is also evidence of improvement amongst other East London boroughs, Hackney (a decrease of 3.6 percentage points), Barking & Dagenham and Newham (both a reduction of 3.5 percentage points).

In terms of bad or very bad health Tower Hamlets has the 4th highest rate in London, (6%) after Islington (6.4%), Hackney (6.2%) and Barking and Dagenham (6.1%).

The census also included a question which asked whether people had a health problem or disability that had lasted for at least 12 months and limited day to day activities. In Tower Hamlets 4.1% of working age residents (16-64) said they had a long term health problem or disability. For all persons the percentage increased to 6.8%.

With a reduction of 3.7 percentage points, Tower Hamlets has had the largest reduction in the proportion of residents with a limiting long term health problem since 2001.

## Mental Health Wellbeing – 2009 Tower Hamlets Health & Lifestyle Survey<sup>11</sup>

The survey used questions from the Warwick-Edinburgh Mental Well-Being Scale (WEMWBS) to gain an understanding of mental health of Tower Hamlets.

This approach identified a strong relationship between age and mental health with older residents making up the significant proportion of those who feel “very low”. Almost one third (27%) of residents aged 55- 64 are in the “very low” category, as are 26% of residents aged 65-74 and 37% of residents aged 75+.

## Unpaid Care<sup>12</sup>

There are over 20,000 people providing unpaid care in Tower Hamlets. 4.3% of residents provide 1- 19 hours per week, 1.4% provide 20-49 hours per week and 1.9% provide 50 hours or more per week. For all three ranges this is at or below the rates for England and Wales (6.5%, 1.4% and 2.4%) and similar to London (5.3%, 1.3% and 1.8%).

In London there has been little change in the last 10 years, with 8.4% of all Londoners providing unpaid care compared to 10.3% nationally.
