

Wraparound childcare supporting Tower Hamlets families

Wraparound childcare is term-time care for primary school-aged children, before and after the school day, usually from 8am-6pm.

It can help parents balance work, study or other commitments while knowing their child is well-cared for in a safe setting.

Wraparound childcare:

- Fits around parents' work, studies or other commitments
- Gives children time to play, relax and make friends
- Is convenient and local – no need for extra drop offs.

Paying for wraparound childcare

Parents can check if they are eligible to use wraparound childcare and if they can have help to pay for their child's place.

- Tax-Free Childcare – for every £8 you pay into your tax free childcare account, the government will pay in £2 to use to pay your childcare provider.

How wraparound childcare has helped me to juggle work and family life

I started using the wraparound childcare at **Elizabeth Selby Infants' School** because my working hours as a teacher are longer than the normal school day. Having the childcare close to my own place of work makes things so much easier for me and a lot less stressful. It means I can focus on my job while knowing my child is safe and happy nearby in a lovely community school.

It's been a huge help in juggling work and family life. I don't have to rush around or worry about pick-up times clashing with my work commitments. The convenience and peace of mind are invaluable.

The best thing about it is how familiar and comfortable the setting is for my son. He's already at the school, so he's in a place he knows well, surrounded by staff and friends he recognises. He really enjoys the activities they do and it's benefiting him socially and emotionally. He's become more independent and looks forward to the sessions, which shows how much he enjoys them.

To other parents considering using wraparound childcare, I'd say it's absolutely worth it. It provides reliable, high-quality care in a familiar environment, supports working parents and gives children a fun end to their school day.

Wraparound childcare – a Headteacher's perspective

We sit down with Shahi Ahmed, Headteacher at **Elizabeth Selby Infants' School**, to find out about the school's wraparound childcare provision and how it's supporting local families.

Tell us about your journey to providing wraparound childcare at your school.

We introduced wraparound childcare after recognising a growing need for flexible support for working families, and gradually built the provision by listening to parents, assessing demand and developing a model that fits our school community.

What have been your biggest challenges?

Our main challenges have been securing reliable staffing, managing the logistics of space and resources and ensuring the provision remained financially sustainable, while still affordable for families.

What have been your key successes?

A key success has been the consistently positive feedback from parents and children, along with strong attendance that shows the provision is valued and meeting real needs.

How has your before and after school childcare benefited the children who attend?

Children benefit from a safe, structured and familiar environment where they can socialise, complete homework and take part in enrichment activities that support their wellbeing.

How has your wraparound childcare provision helped parents?

The extended hours gives them greater flexibility with work patterns, reduces daily stress and provides peace of mind for them because they know their children are well cared for.

What advice would you give to other schools considering providing wraparound childcare?

Start by consulting families to understand demand, begin small if needed and invest in a committed staff team – those three steps make the whole process much smoother.

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

Supporting families through parenting programmes

All parents and carers face challenges from time to time and having the right support can make a big difference. The Parental Engagement Team offers a range of programmes and information to help families as their children grow and develop.

Parenting programmes provide a space for parents to share experiences, learn new strategies and build confidence. They focus on practical skills, such as managing conflict, responding to challenging behaviour positively and adapting approaches as children become more independent.

This term, the team has delivered 17 parenting programmes, attended by 201 parents. Courses have included Strengthening Families, Strengthening Communities, Emotional First Aid, Speakeasy, Triple P Group and Teen and Parent Plus. There has also been an increase in sessions delivered in Bengali, ensuring support is accessible to more families.

Parenting programmes

At times, all parents and carers need help and advice to deal with the everyday challenges of family life. The Parental Engagement Team offer a range of support, information and programmes to support families as their children develop and grow.

Parenting programmes allow parents to share their parenting experiences, learn new skills to deal with challenging behaviour and manage conflict in a positive way.

PROGRAMME	ELIGIBILITY	INFORMATION
Early Repair	All fathers and male carers	Early repair is a brief awareness raising, two-day programme for fathers identified as using abuse (physical and/or emotional and/or coercive control). It is for fathers who are assessed as being a lower risk in accordance with the Tower Hamlets risk matrix. Professional referrals only.
Emotional First Aid	All parents	Offers an overview of mental health and wellbeing in relation to parenting. Learn strategies to manage anxieties, identify stress factors, gain a better understanding of ourselves and promote a healthier sense of wellbeing.
Family Transitions	All parents	For parents who have experienced separation or divorce to learn how to co-parent effectively and to learn strategies for how to deal with the loss of their relationship with their ex-partner.
Strengthening Families, Strengthening Communities	2-18 years	Aims to increase parental self-esteem and confidence and reduce child behavioural difficulties.
Speakeasy	5-18 years	For parents to develop the skills and confidence to talk to their children about growing up, relationships and keeping safe. Explores how relationship and sex education (RSE) is taught in schools and the influence on children from media and peers. Four weekly sessions.
Triple P for Baby	0-12 months	To prepare parents for a positive transition into parenthood and the first year with baby promoting sensitive and responsive care.
Triple P Group	2-11 years	For parents who wish to build positive relationships with their child, increase self-confidence and develop their skills and techniques for dealing with difficult behaviour.
Triple P Teen	12-18 years	For parents who wish to build positive relationships with their teens, increase self-confidence and develop their skills to communicate more effectively with their teens.
Parent Plus ADHD Programme	5-16 years	A programme for parents with children awaiting a diagnosis or diagnosed with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). The course will cover information to help understand the diagnosis and treatment, strategies to support your child and manage difficult behaviour and how to advocate on your child's behalf within the education system. Nine weekly sessions.

Triple P discussion groups

For parents of children aged 2-11 years

- Encouraging positive behaviour
- Managing fighting and aggression
- Developing good bedtime routines
- Hassle-free mealtimes with children

For parents of children aged 12-18 years

- Coping with teenagers' emotions
- Reducing family conflict
- Getting teenagers to co-operate
- Building teenagers' survival skills

New parents wanted for financial wellbeing research project

Financial stress affects every aspect of family life – from housing and nutrition to parents' relationships, mental health and even child development. Yet many families are unsure how to access financial advice or may not be receiving the support they are entitled to.

The Healthier Wealthier Families in East London project, led by University College London, is testing a new model that embeds financial wellbeing into early years care. By focusing on early intervention, the project aims to reduce child poverty and improve long-term outcomes for parents and children.

Researchers are working in partnership with health visitors in Tower Hamlets, the Mary Ward Legal Centre, local Children and Family Centres and parents. The study is inviting new parents to take part to help answer two key questions:

- Does giving money advice really help?
- How can we make it even better?

Recruitment is now open for the project, running until November 2026. To take part, you need to be a parent aged 16 or over, with a new baby (0-3 months old), living in Tower Hamlets and experiencing financial worries.


Supporting emotional wellbeing from birth to adulthood

The Feed Your Way hub

Tower Hamlets has launched a new online hub designed to support families on their baby feeding journeys. The Feed Your Way hub brings together local information and support services in one online space. It aims to help all parents feel confident and supported in their feeding choices.

The hub was created in collaboration with local parents, community groups and health professionals to ensure it reflects the diverse feeding experiences of families in Tower Hamlets.

- Information on local support services, including the Tower Hamlets Baby Feeding and Wellbeing Service.

Mothers have the right to breastfeed anywhere their babies are allowed, and it is illegal for anyone to stop them from doing so in public.

If you prefer privacy, Tower Hamlets Children and Family Centres welcome mothers to drop in and breastfeed in a private space. Many local pharmacists, Idea Stores and One Stop Shops also offer private areas.

Inspiring breakfasts at Harry Gosling

Families from **Harry Gosling**

Primary School recently took part in a hands-on session exploring the impact of food on health and wellbeing. The event was supported by the Women's Environmental Network, a charity that champions environmental issues and works to empower communities to make sustainable lifestyle choices.

The session featured a demonstration based on Jamie Oliver's Ministry of Food, a campaign that encourages cooking from scratch. Parents learned how to prepare three nutritious breakfast recipes designed to give children the best start to their day.

After enjoying the demonstration and tasting, parents left with a goody bag with all the ingredients needed to recreate the meals at home. The session was an opportunity to learn new skills and highlight the importance of starting the day with a nutritious breakfast.



Children's catch-up vaccination clinics



Ensuring children are up to date with their vaccinations is an important part of safeguarding their health. Children can sometimes miss school-based vaccination programmes, so Vaccination UK is running catch-up clinics in Tower Hamlets. Vaccines offered at these clinics include:

- Flu
- DTP (Diphtheria, Tetanus & Polio)
- Meningitis ACWY
- MMR
- HPV (check with the local team for details)

Calling parents – help improve children's dental health

Queen Mary University of London (QMUL) is looking for Bengali/Bangladeshi parents and carers living in the UK to help design a new project that supports children's oral health.

This research is part of a PhD project called 'Keeping it in the Family: Co-designing a family-based, culturally appropriate oral health intervention for children'.

What is the project about?

Children in Tower Hamlets, especially those from Bengali/Bangladeshi families, face higher rates of tooth decay. QMUL want to change this by creating an intervention made with the community and for the community. This might be a video, leaflet, workshop or something else – parents can help shape it.

Who can take part?

QMUL want to form a partnership group of parents/carers who:

- Are of Bengali/Bangladeshi heritage
- Have a child who has experienced dental decay
- Want to share their views and help guide the project
- Can join three online meetings per year.

What will parents do?

Partnership group members will:

- Give feedback on ideas
- Make sure our language is respectful, clear and culturally appropriate
- Help ensure the project is useful, inclusive and relevant to local families



What do parents receive?

Parents will receive a £75 voucher for each meeting they attend and contribute to.

What if you cannot commit to the group?

Interested parents can still take part. There will be four in-person co-design workshops in Tower Hamlets next year. Please share your details if you are interested.

Who is running the project?

The project is run by Paediatric Dentist, Julia Hurry, and funded by Barts Charity with links to QMUL and the Royal London Hospital.

The Tower Hamlets Local Area SEND inspection

The Tower Hamlets Local Area SEND Inspection took place in June. Inspectors found that children and young people with SEND are valued and recognised that weaknesses identified in the previous inspection have been successfully addressed. The report highlighted key areas for improvement, which matched issues already identified in the Local Area Partnership's self-assessment published [here](#).

Following the inspection, the partnership updated its SEND delivery plan. The revised plan, which has been approved by the Department for Education (DfE) and NHS England, sets out how it will address the report's recommendations. The proposed actions will be integrated across the existing priorities of the plan.
