Then what happens?

The EP may come to see you again. You may meet them many times or you may not need to meet them again. The EP will talk to you about the work that you did together.

The EP will help you work with your teachers and family to make a plan specially for you.

And then?

You should start to get on better at school. Grown-ups should notice how things have changed.



What happens if I've got some questions I want to ask?

You can ask your parents or teachers, or the EP.

What is an EP?

An Educational Psychologist, or EP for short, is someone who has been specially trained to understand how young people behave and learn.

Who does the EP meet?

The EP meets children of all ages. Children who need help with:

- their school work
- their behaviour
- Getting on with others.
- speaking and listening.

Who else do EPs work with?

EPs also work with parents, teachers and other adults. They all work together to try and help you do better at school.

Why am I meeting with an EP?

Grown-ups have asked the EP to help you to do better at school.

Where will I meet the EP?

The EP may visit you and your family at home, or visit you in school.

What will happen when I meet the EP?

The EP is interested in how you play, talk, think and learn. They will also ask you about yourself, the things you like doing and don't like doing. They will ask you how you think things could get better. You may do some drawings together. You may be given some puzzles to do.
