#### Then what happens?

The EP may come to see you again. You may meet them many times or you may not need to meet them again. The EP will talk to you about the work that you did together.

The EP will help you work with your teachers and family to make a plan specially for you.

#### And then?

You should start to get on better at school. Adults should notice how things have changed

#### What is an EP?

An Educational Psychologist, or EP for short, is someone who has been specially trained to understand how young people behave and learn.

#### Who does the EP meet?

The EP meets students of all ages. Students who need help with:

- their school work
- their behaviour
- relationships with others.
- speaking and listening.

#### Who else do EPs work with?

EPs also work with parents, teachers and other adults. They all work together to try and help you do better at school.

## Why am I meeting with an EP?

Some adults have asked the EP to help you to do better at school.

#### Where will I meet the EP?

The EP may visit you and your family at home, or visit you in school.

### What will happen when I meet the EP?

The EP is interested in what you think is happening at the moment. They may ask a number of questions, such as:

- how you work best
- what you like doing and what you find difficult to do
- what would help you do better at school.
- how you would like things to change

They may ask you to do some activities to find out more about how you learn.



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
