	 Climate alliance Launch Workshop on the 25th of June at Town Hall- hybrid meeting 2-3pm
Home Energy Advice Programme – Bromley by Bow Centre	 Completed the first year of the programme: Funded by Tower Hamlets Council, to deliver home energy advice to households who are in fuel poverty or at risk of being in fuel poverty. The programme is designed to support households and vulnerable residents with reducing energy usage at home, and financial expenditure towards energy bills. Strands of Delivery: Energy workshops to frontline workers Energy champions Debt Relief Support Free Phone and Home Services
	 Achievements from year 1: 37 Energy champions have been trained and certified 600 households had 1:1 appointment 8 workshops delivered to frontline employees- 102 attendees Through Shines engagement residents have saved an average of 3,897KW of energy £491 in savings and 24,967 littles of water. Maximised income by £15,000, through benefit applications and discount schemes hosted 6 events attended by 402 households who were all provided with energy leaflets and energy advice Debt relief fund: 25 households were supported with accessing financial support of at least £500 towards reducing debts Total of £2500 debt was reduced/written off
	 Next Steps: Energy champions We aim to recruit another 50 energy champions across year 2 of which aim to register at least 38 champions on the course We hope that we can have at least 30 ECs cascade information to at least 400 households





	Frontline workshops We aim to deliver 112 frontline workshops with an average of 10 attendees per workshop. Shine telephone and home visits Shine will aim to conduct 153 triage calls to residents providing them energy efficiency information. Of those 153 Shine will conduct 53 home visits for follow up support. From these engagement we aim to achieve the following: -Average energy savings of 3,388KW per household - Average financial savings of £493 per household - Average Water savings of 6,300 liters of water per household Actions: Rashal to send around leaflet and info regarding the Home Energy Advice Programme
Case study for Carbon Reduction Community Grant - Rich Mix	Rich Mix is committed to minimising its environmental impact and promoting sustainable practices. Key commitments: Raising awareness Reducing waste Saving energy Awarded the community carbon reduction grant by TH with which they are incorporating sustainable food practices. Created a composting system, using their food waste to create compost Engaged community in the delivery of the project.
