#### **SYNOPSIS**

Marriage is Murder is an ensemble dark comedy murder mystery. It centres around the perilous task of finding a life partner. Siyena, a jaded marriage detective shows up at a wedding to collect an overdue payment, only to find herself in the middle of a murder. Now she and her trusted assistant Kasandra will have to find the killer amongst them while trying to answer what love looks like in this modern age.

Finding a life partner can be the death of you!

## TWENTY ACTS OF LOVE BY COLLAB ARTS

#### **SYNOPSIS**

"I let twenty years of love blind me to his flaws."

Maya and Amanda are from different generations, cultures and backgrounds. They meet for the first time in a hospital waiting room. They meet in unusual circumstances. They start to question their understanding of each other and the people whose lives are interwoven with theirs. They embark on unlocking the truth.

This is a 15-minute performance piece. It is a commission especially for A Season of Bangla Drama 2023. It tells the story of the second generation of Bengalis who have seen the struggle of their parents. They have fought hard to avoid history repeating itself for their siblings.

This piece may include inappropriate language. There are also moments of outrage and mentions of physical injury.

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

This collaborative performance piece was written, directed and acted by Rokshana Khan. It is acted and produced by Clarice Montero. Both are long-time participants of the festival. Both have studied drama and worked in community theatre.



## BIBORNO KRISHNOCHURA BY MONCHOSHOILEE

#### **SYNOPSIS**

Mr Kamran is a towering, award-winning figure in Bengali literature. Yet his son Rudra is unfamiliar with his father's literary works and is indifferent to his legacy. This is due to a language barrier and his western lifestyle. This stems from a fascination with English culture. It alienates Rudra from his parents. In an interview with a reporter, Mr Kamran realised that no-one will inherit his creative output. Furthermore, he and his wife Sajeda are drifting apart.

The focus shifts to single mother Nayla Haque, and her attraction to Irfan who is Pakistani. The cultural differences, perceived hostility and language barrier are a challenge for their relationship. Nayla is aware of the ensuing tension between romantic love and ancestral love, or a sense of belonging. All protagonists face inner conflicts. Can love help resolve these issues or are love's many faces the root of the problem.

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Monchoshoilee have been part of A Season of Bangla Drama since 2010. They mirror the best and worst of society on stage. This both educates and entertains the audience. Monchoshoilee fuse eastern and western theatre practices to engage new generations.

## HARMONIUM MELODIES BY DHANUSH VEENA GIRIDHAR

#### **SYNOPSIS**

A theatre piece with musical elements that explores how the love of music spans different generations and brings people together.

"Harmonium Melodies" looks at how the love of music spans generations. It explores how people express themselves with music. The story follows a young and traditionally trained musician who yearns to be a pop star. It follows the hurdles faced in pursuit of such goals. It maps the journey through the way they engage with music.

The play looks at how people across generations support, and sometimes judge, decisions made by those pursuing music. The story uses music as a backdrop to reveal the importance of valuing the community.

#### **ABOUT THE ARTIST**

Dhanush is an emerging young theatre practitioner. His play, 'The Startup', was described as a 'standout' piece in the ACT II Festival. He has performed in Blue Elephant Theatre's inter-generational community play. He trained at Tara Theatre's Young Company and is part of WAC Actors Young Company.

#### **SYNOPSIS**

Set in post-lockdown UK 'Extramarital', 60 per cent of which is in English, is a light-hearted play within a play. The story follows the extramarital affairs of two couples who take the love and strength in their relationships for granted. They are bored, and search for excitement and pleasure elsewhere.

As rehearsals for the play descend into chaos, slap-stick comedy is on show along with a glimpse of the drama

'back-stage'. The parallels between the actors' lives on and off the stage become clearer. The line between reality and fiction gets blurred.

The play ends with the main characters realising the value of their existing relationships. This entertaining romp will give the audience food for thought.

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Ayna Arts provides a creative platform for empowerment and self-expression. They focus on theatre productions that explore social and humanitarian issues. ## SHIMANA PERIYE (BEYOND THE BOUNDARY) BY BANGLADESH UDICHI SHILPI GOSHTI UK SANGSHAD

#### **SYNOPSIS**

This is a story about the love of two young people from different cultures.

One was born and brought up in Birmingham with parents who are Bangladeshi born Muslims. They herald from two different regions of Bangladesh. Despite differing social backgrounds, they fell in love. They married against their parents' wishes and migrated to the UK.

The other is offspring of a Somali refugee family. They meet at university and are idealists who dream about justice and a lack of prejudice in society. They share their experiences which leads to a greater understanding of one another. After graduation they decide to tie the knot. Breaking the news to their families causes conflict. Despite a shared religion, their respective Asian and African backgrounds are very different. They face prejudice and misinformation. This puts a huge pressure on their love.



#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Bangladesh Udichi Shilpi Gosthi UK Sangshad works across creative disciplines. It promotes the cultural heritage of Bangladesh. They use music, dance, drama, literature, and more. The organisation encourages progressive thinking.

Udichi is based in London with a branch in Birmingham. It also runs Soytten Sen School of Performing Arts (SSSPA) located in Tower Hamlets.

## THE GREEKS HAVE 6 WORDS FOR LOVE BY MMAJ PRODUCTIONS

#### **SYNOPSIS**

The Greeks Have 6 Words for Love is based on a true story. This is a story of friendship which straddles cultures and religions. It focuses on three residents of Tower Hamlets.

The play is set in the 22nd century. Researchers are trying to discover if love actually existed in the first decades of the 21st century. They see the prevalence of wars, hatred and fear stoked by social media.

Researchers discover recordings of conversations between the three friends. One is called Jelinek. She shares a surname with the man who spearheaded voice recognition for IBM in the 1970s. She is Jewish. The other two are nameless, but one is a Bengali cockney woman and the other is a Somali woman refugee.

The story explores numerous aspects of love, despite the barriers put up by communities.



#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Alana Jelinek, writer, and Maheen Mohammadally, director are Londonbased artists. They have collaborated on this project under MMAJ Productions.

Alana migrated to Tower Hamlets from Australia in 1991. She is passionate about the area and its stories. Maheen is from London. Like Alana, she is eager to amplify under-represented voices.

### **CYCLES BY FARHA BI**

#### **SYNOPSIS**

In 2018, feeling burnt-out and untethered from her sense of self, Farha cycled 15,000km from Mile End to Benin. She took to the road to rediscover the ancestral knowledge within. She sought a sense of belonging and freedom through nature. In this evening of storytelling, Farha invites you in, to share a cup of chaa and a story, and to become part of her journey.

#### **ABOUT THE ARTISTS**

Farha is a creative thinker, community organiser, social justice activist and storyteller. She breathes life into wild dreams! She loves to slow-travel. She explores different ways of (un)learning, (re)centring ancestral knowledge. This is through daily practice and connections with land. Farha grew up in both 1990s Birmingham and 1960s Kashmir. She has mastered the art of time travel

Shavena is a singer and musician from London. She trained in Carnatic music and spent some time as a jazz singer. Drawing from these and other influences she creates vibrant, soulful compositions.





## AVINASHI ANURAG (ETERNAL LOVE) BY ADITY ROY DANCE CIC

#### **SYNOPSIS**

An autistic child fights against all the odds and many obstacles that life throws at her. These include difficulties at school, socially and at home. She also feels anxious and insecure because of the war in Ukraine. Her ability to overcome these obstacles is only possible through acceptance and love.

This production highlights the need for empathy, inclusion, acceptance and

love. This is particularly true of the more vulnerable members of society including young people with special needs.

This production uses dance to convey an important message. Namely, that love can help one can find the eternal beauty, peace and essence of life. It can help overcome problems and challenges, both amongst individuals and nations.

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Adity Roy is a London based dancer, choreographer and teacher. She trained in Bharatanatyam Indian dance. She has performed in the UK and abroad. She has choreographed an array of work in schools and for the community. She teaches dance movements to neurodiverse children with a variety of special needs.

#### **SYNOPSIS**

This is an adaptation of 'Mejdidi', a popular classic short story from Bengali literature. It was written decades ago by Sharat Chandra Chattapadhay. Its message is still relevant. The backdrop is a modern British Bangladeshi family. This version of the story depicts the same motherly affection.

This play tackles the theme of "love" in a unique way. It represents the undying love between an orphan boy and his adopted mother, Samira. She is willing to sacrifice her family relationships for the happiness of the orphan.

This play contrasts love and care with self-centredness. It shows how two strangers bond and forge a mother-son relationship. It shows that a mother's love transcends boundaries of personal and social limitations.

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Trioarts is a London based cultural organisation formed in 2020. They use music, dance and drama to focus on current issues facing the Bangladeshi community. They concentrate on issues facing women and children.

#### **SYNOPSIS**

'Who is there?' is a satire on culture and freedom of speech. It is a humorous foray into the rights of performers and artists. The play explores whether freedom of speech is actual or mythical. It intertwines this with love for ones birthplace and heritage.

How is patriotism defined? It looks at the concept of a "Big Brother" state. Has

government surveillance and control reached ridiculous extremes? These questions are prevalent through the story of a group of eccentric characters. They become heroes of resistance in a dystopian society where citizens' lives are tightly controlled.

# THE TWO HEADED BIRD (DOU MARTHA PAKHI) BY TAMARIND THEATRE CO.

## Friday 24 November

#### **SYNOPSIS**

The Two Headed Bird is an exciting interactive performance. It uses theatre storytelling with music, song and dance to entertain the whole family. A young woman concerned about the environment visits her grandfather on the River Thames. She and her friends are unhappy that the local business magnate wants to turn their green space into a car park.

Her grandfather shares his story of Tarun the fishermen. He goes in search of the mythical Two Headed Bird to achieve fame and fortune. Everyone warns him not to go including his mother and his friend Pubali who loves him. Against their wishes Tarun goes out on a stormy night and encounters the deadly leopard. Will the soldiers capture him and punish the village? Can Pubali save him in time. Will Tarun be saved or will he meet disaster?

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Tamarind Theatre Company make interactive theatre storytelling for everyone. Since 2009 it has created 12 productions which celebrate language, culture and well-being. They use stories originating in India, Bangladesh and the UK. They also offer arts and theatre training to new artists, young people, families and communities.



## PRITHOK PALONKO (A PALANQUIN OF ONE'S OWN) BY BISHWO SHAHITTO KENDRO (BSK) UK

#### **SYNOPSIS**

This play tells the legendary love story of iconic Bengali poet Abul Hasan and scholar-poet Suraiya Khanum. It is set in the post-independence era of Bangladesh.

Suraiya Khanum is a brilliant Cambridge graduate and advocate for Bangladesh's independence. She returns to teach at Dhaka University in the early 1970s, becoming a muse for young poets. There, she falls in love with Abul Hasan, a celebrated modern poet. Their love

blossoms, and they continue to inspire one another's poetry. Hasan's life is cut short in 1975, leaving Suraiya devastated.

The play also explores parallels with Sylvia Plath and Ted Hughes. It embraces the confessional movement of the mid-20th century. It highlights the profound influence of love upon poetry and the impact of love and loss on the oeuvre of these writers. It depicts the solace of nature as an escape from personal turmoil. The enduring legacy of Hasan and Khanum's poetry is a testament to their profound connection.

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

Bishwo Shahitto Kendro, UK (BSK, UK) engage the community through events in Bengali and English. They run festivals and workshops. These help forge connections between participants from diverse backgrounds.

## FHIRE PAWA JOUBAN (YOUTHFULNESS RETURNS) BY MITALI ARTS GROUP

### **Sunday 26 November**

#### **SYNOPSIS**

The play follows the story of eight characters. All are in their senior years. It follows their journeys from loneliness and isolation to well-being and connectedness. It is a testament to how lifestyle changes can help overcome depression.

Love and friendship are key to this transformation. Meeting up, making plans and helping one another through group activities and physical exercise all play a part.

Hilarity ensues when Ameena is mistakenly assumed to be pregnant. There is also romance in the air between an older bachelor Moni, and Meena, a singer.

The play ends with the affirmation that the characters are, 'retired but not redundant'!

#### **ABOUT THE COMPANY**

The Mitali Arts Group was formed in 1978. The group has produced many plays, both in Bangla and English. The group members are talented, semiprofessional members of the community.

They develop their own scripts, focusing on issues relevant to the local community.

## BRICK LANE: A COMMUNITY PORTRAIT BY KOIS MIAH

This window display is a preview of Brick Lane: A Community Portrait. This tells the stories of British Bangladeshis from Brick Lane. This iconic street became the heart of a fledgling community in the 1960s. The first of a series of photos and video interviews captures the narratives of the migration journey. They record the complexities of transition to east London and how it shaped their lives.

The photographs celebrate the ordinary men and women who have helped make Brick Lane the extraordinary community it is today. This project documents a unique time and place, capturing the last of those voices as a legacy of our recent past.

Kois Miah is a London based British Bangladeshi photographer and film maker. His primary projects combine photography/film with community participation. He has a personal connection with the cityscape and communities living and working in East London.

India Company and the Portuguese traders. Learn about the British Chandlers, the Bengal slaves and the Dutch officers. All played a role in this spicy story of love, power, survival and trade.
