

Summing up what she loves about Tower Hamlets, Sister Christine Frost MBE, the founder and manager of community organisation Neighbours in Poplar says: "It's the friendliness, generosity, and kindness of people."

Neighbours in Poplar (NiP), formed 57 years ago, is committed to improving the lives of vulnerable people in Tower Hamlets. At the end of August, the charity marked a major milestone with the delivery of its 60,000th meal since the start of the Covid pandemic in 2020.

"At the start of the pandemic, a few volunteers met to talk about

what we might be able to do for people in our local community. We decided to do shopping and deliver meals to Poplar residents. Covid exposed how lonely people often are. We also chose to set up a telephone buddy scheme," Sister Christine explained.

Since 2020, the initiative has gradually grown and now sees up to 60 volunteers deliver meals to 148 residents across the borough on a weekly basis.

The volunteers include people from all backgrounds and ages, including firefighters, a former actor, a member of the House of Lords, retied pensioners and younger adults.

Between them, the volunteers peel, wash and prepare vegetables, cook food, pack fresh, hot meals into containers and deliver them to residents.

Rita Brett, a retired pharmacy worker who has been volunteering since 2021, said: "I do it because it is important to me to help my local community."

Sister Christine added: "A resident once said, "When I hear that knock on the door, it shows that

someone cares."

Susan and Eddie volunteer as a couple and drop off meals to nine households every week. They spoke about a deep friendship they developed with one of the residents they regularly visited, who passed away 14 months after they met.

"He was in his 70s and lived on his own. I used to take him for hospital check-ups and we later helped him to gain admission into a care home. We were the only people he had. He was an unbelievable gentleman."

Referrals to NiP come from other residents and community organisations.

Neighbours in Poplar, which is not council-run, is also one of the borough's LinkAge Plus hubs for people over 50 living in Tower Hamlets. LinkAge Plus works with older people to improve their wellbeing and increase their social networks. It is co-funded by Tower Hamlets Council and North East London Integrated Care Board.

Every Wednesday was a Love Tower Hamlets family fun day, as council, parks and Family Hub teams welcomed visitors to parks and open spaces in different locations each week for sport, play, arts and crafts, give-aways and more.

Elsewhere, activities such as drama, interactive storytelling, and creative sessions kept children occupied and entertained at Idea Stores and libraries.

New this year, the Summer of Fun Reading Challenge gave participants an opportunity to read books, collect stamps and enter a prize draw at activities across the borough.

Young Tower Hamlets and youth centres also hosted dozens of free workshops, trips, and

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Festivals and friends



All Points East returned to Tower Hamlets this summer, turning Victoria Park into what one festival goer described as 'one big dance floor.'

Headliners included Barry Can't Swim, Raye, Cleo Sol, Chase & Status and The Maccabees.

In between the two festival weekends, Tower Hamlets Council partnered with festival organisers to host community festival In the Neighbourhood.

The four-day programme offered free entry and free activities to residents and visitors, including live music, creative workshops, dance, theatre, sports and wellbeing, family activities and loads more.

All Points East and In the Neighbourhood, amongst other festivals, are a fantastic showcase of the rich and diverse culture of Tower Hamlets, which is being celebrated with the #LoveTowerHamlets hashtag.

As a huge new addition to the free community-based programme, the globally renowned DJ Pete Tong headlined The East Stage on Sunday 17 August, with a celebration of modern and classic anthems. Tong was joined by DJ Yoda presents 50 years of Hip Hop, The Cuban Brothers, Kengo and The Tamashii Drummers.

Ahead of headlining at Victoria Park, Pete Tong said, "Really looking forward to bringing some Ibiza vibes to All Points East this Sunday.

"It's a great chance to play these tracks in the heart of London and bring a selection of some of my favourite tunes to a festival crowd."

Spotlight, a creative youth

space based in Poplar, offered a variety of free creative programmes and sessions for young people aged II-19 (up to 25 with SEND). There were live performances ranging from local emerging artists in music, dance and DJ'ing.

Other free activities included live theatre shows from Half Moon Presents. Based in Whitechapel, they give young people up to age 18 (25 for young people with disabilities) an opportunity to experience the best in young people's theatre, both as a participant and as an audience member. Elsewhere, free fitness sessions were available from the council's Be Well team.

Children also learnt new skills and confidence from Limehouse Boxing Academy, a community-led boxing club based in Tower Hamlets.

Rich Mix, the friendly neighbourhood arts centre, showcased the freshest local talent from rappers, singers and DJs, as well

as having a kids disco, a book swap and performances by local young people.

For kids and families eager to learn more about community building, the Sunny Jar Eco Hub taught kids and teens how to upcycle all sorts of scrap paper into beautiful beads to create their own eco-friendly jewellery.

One festival visitor commented: "What a line-up and completely free."

Cllr Kamrul Hussain, lead member for Culture and Recreation, said: "It was exciting to welcome In the Neighbourhood back to our award-winning Victoria Park this summer. The free festival is a fantastic showcase for the rich and diverse culture and enterprise of Tower Hamlets. Curry and a tour: return of f weekend a hit with thousand



Residents and tourists were able to enjoy an amazing weekend exploring Tower Hamlets' history and heritage with an open day at the Town Hall, one of the nation's most historic buildings, and the Brick Lane Curry Festival.

More than 22,500 people enjoyed the weekend of culture celebrating Tower Hamlets' diversity.

After a nine-year break, the Brick Lane Curry festival returned to the East End to reclaim Brick Lane's crown as the Curry Capital of the

Over three days, the festival brought together the flavours of South Asia with the creativity and energy of the East End.

The celebrations began with free events on Friday 19 and Saturday 20 September, including henna workshops, and heritage walks with The Cockney Sikh and the Swadhinata Trust. Residents also enjoyed dance taster sessions with Showmi Das and China Chowdhury from Taal Torongo.

Sunday 21 September marked the main festival day, with vibrant floats as part of a parade that travelled up and down the iconic street, as well as street entertainers, fantastic DJ sets, plus pop-up food stalls and live cooking demonstrations.

Alongside the curry festival, the Town Hall Open Day gave visitors the chance to have guided tours of the new civic building, view exhibitions, and enjoy local performers, including Caribbean Steel Pan Band, Elite Irish Dance, Jewish Klezmer music, Chinese dragon dancing, and Somali and Bengali dancers, all hosted expertly by members of the Tower Hamlets Youth Council.

There was also wall climbing,

line dancing, arts and crafts and a community marketplace. The Pearly heritage, rooted in local pride, Kings and Queens shared stories of resilience, and solidarity. These the East End through the ages.

From hospital to hall: A quick history of the borough's new Town Hall



Tower Hamlets Council brought the old Royal London Hospital building in Whitechapel back into community use as our new Town Hall. Opened in 1757, the grade II listed building was once a bustling facility where generations of east Londoners were born and cared for. It was also the home to Joseph Merrick, known as the Elephant Man, and trained generations of healthcare workers, including Annie Brewster, one of the first Black nurses in Britain, and Elizabeth Garrett Anderson, the first woman to qualify as a surgeon.

Despite being one of London's most important structures it has been closed since 2014 and was falling into disrepair. The council saved the building by transforming it into the borough's new town hall to serve the public once again.

The entire ground floor is dedicated for public use in an accessible place which is a stark contrast to the council's former civic centre which was in a rented premises in East India Dock.

£400k to improve 3 playgrounds

Visitors to Gosling Gardens in Shadwell, Brickfield Gardens in Mile End, and Vallance Gardens in Whitechapel can enjoy enhanced play, exercise and outdoor leisure facilities, thanks to a £400k investment in improvements by the council.

Brickfield Gardens has a new gated play area for toddlers and young people, including unique play features for children with special needs.

A new outdoor gym with fitness equipment for people of all abilities has also been installed.

At Gosling Gardens, enhanced play facilities, new CCTV, an outdoor gym, additional lights and a dropped kerb have been put in.

The vegetation has been cut back to deter crime, and a range of tree species have been planted, giving the park additional colour. There are also new picnic tables and benches.

An outdated playground at Vallance Gardens has been replaced with inclusive play equipment for children of all ages and abilities.

Additionally, the council has spent over *f* rok on a new CCTV camera in the park to discourage anti-social behaviour.

Lutfur Rahman, Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, and Cllr Kamrul Hussain, Cabinet Member for Culture and Recreation, visited Brickfield Gardens where they met residents enjoying the new facilities during the school half-term holidays.

Cllr Hussain said: "These newly improved facilities will make a real difference to individuals and families in the borough.

"These excellent quality and well maintained open spaces will enable residents to experience activities which meet their needs, from play and recreation to fitness, sport and social interaction."

Fingers crossed for In Bloom finals



The UK finals will be announced this October

Tower Hamlets welcomed judges for the Britain in Bloom UK Finals this summer when they visited to assess the beauty of the borough's colourful floral displays and gardens as well as its biodiversity and community gardening.

Judges were given a tour of locations across the borough, visiting gardens, parks, nature reserves, a city farm, housing estates and community growing schemes, as well Victoria Park and the Canary Wharf estate.

Tower Hamlets was one of eight top floral destinations in the country that was visited by the national judges this summer.

The borough is competing against

Harrogate, Royal Tunbridge Wells, Aberdeen Communities Together, Shrewsberry, Chorley in Bloom, Derry, and Torquay in Bloom for the prestige title.

The winner of the Britain in Bloom UK Finals will be announced at a special presentation ceremony in Brighton this October.

Cllr Kamrul Hussain, Cabinet Member for Culture and Recreation, said: "It was a real pleasure to welcome the Britain in Bloom judges to Tower Hamlets.

"The tour not only celebrated our vibrant floral displays, but also our community spirit and passion and commitment to our environment."

14 of our parks praised nationally

Tower Hamlets Council is raising its Green Flags again, as all 14 of the borough's award-winning parks including Victoria Park have retained their Green Flag Award status this year.

The sites are among 2,250 in the UK to achieve the award, which is the international quality mark for parks and green spaces.

Grants to help with cost of school clothing launches

COST OF LIVING

Families in Tower Hamlets could be eligible for a grant to help with the cost of school clothing.

Applications are open until 30 September for the grant for children who have started primary and secondary school this September, to support families dealing with ongoing cost-of-living pressures.

The council's new £1m-a-year fund for school clothing grants allow families with household incomes of up to £50,350 to claim £50 per child entering primary school at reception year, and £150 per child entering secondary school at year 7.



I'm proud that we are leading the way nationally as the first council in the country to provide this support The new funding is expected to provide up to 7,000 children each year with extra support to buy their school clothing and uniforms, supporting 21,000 children over the next three years.

Parents can make an application from when they are notified of their child's school placement until 30 September that year for a child aged 4 and starting reception, or a child aged 11 and transferring from primary to secondary school.

Mum Ruhena whose daughter Amarah is starting at Mulberry Academy Shoreditch this September said: "This is a positive scheme and really beneficial for families especially with the rising cost of school uniforms and cost of living. School blazers and PE kits can be some of the more expensive items and children can grow out of clothing very quickly, so parents need to buy clothing and sometimes spare sets throughout the year."

Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, Lutfur Rahman said: "I'm proud that we are leading the way nationally as the first council in the country to provide this support to families ensuring every child, regardless of their background, has the best chance to thrive in

education.

"Starting a new school is a special rite of passage for children, who will be keen to make a happy and confident start, but the costs associated with starting school places an extra financial strain on families."

Cllr Saied Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Resources, Cost of Living and the Voluntary and Community Sector, said: "Our enhanced school clothing grant scheme means that up to 7,000 children a year will get extra support to ensure they are ready to learn.

"I encourage all local families who feel that they may qualify for one of the payments to check out the details and see if they can make a claim."

Big Door Knock to ensure tenants' voices are heard

HOUSING

Residents across seven estates in Tower Hamlets had the opportunity to share their thoughts on their homes, neighbourhoods and the services offered by Tower Hamlets Council during the Big Door Knock.

Officers from across Housing Management Service at the council knocked on hundreds of doors across the borough, speaking directly with tenants and leaseholders.

They asked questions, listened carefully, and heard from hundreds of residents about key issues including repairs, maintenance,

anti-social behaviour, communication.

Alongside the door knocking, community fun days were held in local parks to bring people together and create a relaxed space for conversation.

Families enjoyed free activities for children, food, and games, while council teams were on hand to speak more in-depth with residents about any concerns or questions they had.

Stalls featured officers from the Community Safety Team, including THEOs, as well as staff from WorkPath, the council's employment service, the Recycling Team, and other services that support residents and help look after residents who joined us at the fun estates.

Cllr Kabir Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Regeneration, Inclusive Development and Housebuilding, said: "The Big Door Knock is about listening to residents and making sure their voices shape the services that affect their homes.

"It's important for us to keep coming back, speaking to people, and finding out what really matters to them, so we can provide the safe, high-quality and well-maintained homes they deserve.

"I want to say a heartfelt thank you to everyone who opened their door to us, gave us their time, and shared their views. And thank you to all the

days."

All staff taking part wore council ID and asked residents a few short questions to gather feedback.

The Big Door Knock is part of a wider plan to improve housing services.

Through its 'Your Voice, Our Action' campaign, the council is committed to making real changes with residents' views at the heart of it all.

The council is now reviewing all the feedback from the Big Door Knock and Community Fun Days and will use it to shape improvements to housing services going forward.

or private renters

The Renters' Rights Bill, which promises a sweeping overhaul of the private rental sector, is expected to come into law later this year.

This means that residents who are renting privately will have more protection. In Tower Hamlets, that is currently around 38 per cent of all homes.

The Bill seeks to end 'no fault' evictions and replace fixed-term tenancies with rolling periodic tenancies, permitting tenants to end their tenancy with two-months'

Rent increases will be limited, bidding wars banned, meaning that offers above the advertised rent are

forbidden, and rent in advance will be limited to one month only.

The Decent Homes Standard and Awaab's Law, which ensure council homes are in a good state of repair, have modern facilities, are warm and free from damp and mould, will be extended to private rental homes.

A national landlord database will

also be created and fines ranging from £5,000 to an unlimited amount depending on the offence, will apply.

Make your house more energy efficient

Tower Hamlets homeowners can now benefit from warmer homes and lower energy bills thanks to a new energy efficiency programme launched by the council.

The Residential Energy Efficiency Programme offers free home improvements worth up to £10,000 to those who own their own homes, helping residents stay warm while reducing their energy use.

This new scheme builds on the

success of earlier boiler replacement programmes and now includes a wider range of upgrades.

Depending on your home and needs, you could receive improvements such as a new energy-efficient boiler, double glazing, insulation, solar panels, or even a heat pump.

All works are arranged by the council and come with a 12-month warranty for peace of mind.

To be eligible for the programme, the property must either be leasehold or freehold and one of the residents must receive a qualifying benefit, such as Universal Credit, Pension Credit, or Disability Living Allowance.

The application process is simple. Once you apply online, the council will check your eligibility and arrange for a surveyor to visit your home to assess what improvements are suitable.

Applications are usually processed within ten working days.

Join a resident association

HOUSING

There are more than 30 Tenants' and Residents' Associations (TRAs) across council estates in Tower Hamlets. These groups are run by residents, for residents, and they play a vital role in shaping our local neighbourhoods.

A TRA is a group of neighbours who come together to improve their estate or block. Whether it's raising concerns about repairs, organising community events, or working with the council to make improvements, TRAs give residents a stronger voice and a real say in how their neighbourhood is run.

TRAs also help build a sense of community. From coffee mornings

to clean-up days, they bring people together and help make our estates friendlier, safer, and more connected places to live.

There are TRAs in nearly every part of the borough - from Limehouse to Wapping, Cranbrook to Shadwell. Each one is led by a local chairperson and supported by volunteers who care about their community.

Steve Russell, Chair of the Locksley Community TRA, said: "Our TRA supports residents and represent members on important matters and to act on their behalf with the council. Our TRA also organise social events, community projects, and we seek funding for local initiatives, social gatherings, outings, or festive celebrations. We

have great support from the council's community partnerships team."

Jahid Ahmed, Chair of the Chicksand East TRA, added: "Chicksand East TRA brings neighbours together to create a stronger, more connected community. By voicing resident concerns, supporting local improvements, and fostering collaboration, the TRA helps to advocate for local safety, inclusiveness, and respond to local issues and concerns."

If you live on a council housing estate in Tower Hamlets and there isn't a TRA where you live, why not start one? The council can help you set up a new group and provide support along the way. Residents of other landlords will need to get in touch with their landlord. It's a great

way to meet your neighbours and make a positive difference.

For those who want to take an even more active role, there are also Tenant Management Organisations (TMOs). These are resident-led groups that take on responsibility for managing housing services, such as repairs and cleaning. TMOs give residents even more control over how their estates are run.

If you are a leaseholder, private tenant or housing association tenant, get in touch with your landlord to see if they have an active residents' forum.

3,000 new homes for our residents

fast-track up to 3,332 new homes across 37 council-owned sites in Tower Hamlets has been approved.

The Mayor's Accelerated Housing Programme (MAHP) will be delivered over the next five years with a focus on affordable and larger family homes.

This is in addition to the existing commitment to deliver 4,000 genuinely affordable homes by May 2026, with the council on track to exceed this target.

The announcement, combined with the new affordable homes already being delivered, represents

A home-building programme to housing programmes in the country.

Rahman. Lutfur Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "This programme is not just about numbers, it's about transforming people's lives.

"Inadequate housing blights lives, affecting everything from health and education to employment and life expectancy.

"I'm proud that we are launching one of the most ambitious affordable housing programmes in the country.

While other councils struggle to build, Tower Hamlets is leading the way, delivering safe, sustainable, high-quality council homes that one of the most ambitious affordable meet the needs of our residents.

particularly by providing large, family-sized and accessible homes.

"Tower Hamlets has an urgent $need \, for \, affordable \, housing, \, with \, too \,$ many families living in overcrowded or unsuitable conditions. We are committed to keeping people in our communities, in secure homes they can afford, and providing future generations with comfortable, decent housing for many years to come."

The council has agreed a budget of *f*8million to fund the progression of the MAHP's development to the next stage.

The MAHP complements housing already being delivered through the Council's Capital Programme, development partnerships, Section 106 agreements.

The council will take full advantage of the government's £38billion investment in affordable housing and other initiatives announced in the June 2025 Comprehensive Spending Review.

The next phase of the MAHP will see the development of a full business plan and the formation of delivery partnerships with the Greater London Authority (GLA), Homes England, institutional investors, and third-party developers - all aimed at delivering homes at pace and maximising affordability.

Some of the recent progress on house building in the borough includes:



Work to build six, four-bedroom homes in Buckhurst Street on the site of disused garages has started.

The Deputy Mayor of Tower Hamlets Maium Talukdar and Cllr Kabir Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Regeneration, Inclusive Development and Housebuilding, visited the site for a progress update with developers Elkins Construction.

Construction is underway and due to complete in 2026.



Tower Hamlets Council has approved plans to demolish a former council office building in Bethnal Green East to make way for 53 affordable homes.

Albert Jacob House, in Roman Road, will be demolished and turned into a new development of 5 to 9 storeys, containing 53 homes, and five commercial units on the ground floor for local businesses.

The development was approved subject to planning obligations and conditions. It has been designed by Child Graddon Lewis, a RIBA Awardwinning architecture practice with three decades of design experience.




Plans to build nearly 2,000 homes were given the go-ahead at a Tower Hamlets Council meeting in July.

The plans, brought to Tower Hamlets Council's Strategic Development Committee by Poplar HARCA and the Hill Group, will see 535 homes on the 1950s Teviot Estate in Poplar knocked down and replaced by 1,928 brand new homes, nearly quadrupling the number of available homes.

The council-approved plans include 411 homes for social rent, including 202 family-sized properties.

The first phase of the scheme will deliver 44% affordable homes.



Tower Hamlets Council and Jerram Falkus Construction have celebrated a milestone with the topping out of 62 new council homes in Bow.

The building is 100 per cent affordable new council homes, with each home being rented at social rent or Tower Hamlets living rent rates.

Arnold Road comprises one, two, three and four bedroom homes including six wheelchair adaptable units in two blocks.

The ground floor will feature five commercial units for local businesses.

Crack down on anti-social behaviour

More than 1,100 residents took part in 19 events across the borough in July for Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) Awareness Week.

Events included partnership engagement sessions with Poplar HARCA, bike and phone marking, crime prevention advice, enforcement patrols and walkabouts with residents and partners.

Residents were able to access

safety information, learn how to report incidents, and discover how the Public Protection and Integrated Enforcement teams are working to tackle anti-social behaviour.

The council's enforcement teams also carried out traffic operations in collaboration with the Police, conducted weapons sweeps, and delivered nitrous oxide awareness activities in partnership with the Osmani Trust.

As part of the week's activities, there were a number of arrests, including for driving while over the prescribed drug limit, dangerous driving and failing to stop.

Officers conducted stop-andsearches for drugs, involving substances such as cannabis, nitrous oxide, and Xanax.

Traffic enforcement led to the seizure of multiple vehicles, including a moped and several cars found to be uninsured or in dangerous condition. An eBike was also confiscated for not meeting insurance and licensing requirements.

In addition, three Section 59 warnings were issued for anti-social use of vehicles.

The success of ASB Awareness Week was made possible thanks to the collaboration of a wide range of partners and teams.

New rules for dog owners come into effect this autumn

FIGHTING CRIME

From 1st October 2025, new rules will come into effect for dog owners across Tower Hamlets to help keep public spaces safe and enjoyable for everyone.

The Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) for dog control, approved by Cabinet on 30 April 2025, sets out where dogs must be kept on leads and where they can roam freely.

New rules include:

- Dogs must be on leads when on roads, pavements, and housing estates.
- Dogs can be off-lead in public parks and open spaces.
- Dogs are not allowed in gated children's play areas or gated sports areas (such as Multi-Use Games Areas or MUGAs).

The PSPO was introduced in response to concerns from residents

about dangerous dogs, and aims to strike a balance between public safety and the needs of responsible dog owners.

The council launched a consultation in 2024 after receiving enquiries about its policy on dangerous dogs and following several highprofile incidents involving dogs in public spaces across London. The consultation received 2,267 responses from local residents and the wider community, including animal welfare organisations such as the RSPCA, Battersea Dogs and Cats Home, The Kennel Club, and the East London Dog Community.

Anyone who fails to comply with the order may face a f100 fixed penalty notice or prosecution, which could lead to a fine of up to f1,000.

There are exemptions for people who are blind, disabled, or who rely on assistance dogs, in line with the Equality Act 2010.

£35,000 fine for selling knife to teen in Trading Standards sting

A Mile End shop which sold a knife £27,090.11. to a child and stocked illegal alcohol and vapes has been fined over plus a £190 victim surcharge £35,000 by a court.

China Ark Supermarket, located at 84 Mile End Road, sold a 6.5-inch undercover test carried out last year by Tower Hamlets Council's Trading Standards Team, with support from the Metropolitan Police.

It was also found to be selling Enforcement, said: alcohol without a licence and to be selling vapes which has packaging in foreign languages, making them unlawful to sell in the UK.

The prosecution was brought by the council's Legal Services Team before Thames Magistrates' defendants pleaded guilty to their charges.

Asian Food Ltd, the company owns China Supermarket, was fined £22,800, plus a £2,000 victim surcharge and $f_{2,290.11}$ in costs, totalling

Xiongdi was fined $f_{4,800}$, and $f_{2,290.11}$ in costs, totalling

Ning Yang Cao was fined £576, cleaver to a 15-year-old during an plus a £230 victim surcharge and f_{250} in costs, totalling $f_{1,056}$.

Sniffer dog finds illegal cigarettes

A sharp-nosed sniffer dog is being hailed a 'hero' after uncovering a hidden stash of illegal cigarettes, vapes, and unlicensed Viagra tablets during an enforcement operation in Tower Hamlets.

While patrolling with Trading Standards officers on Wednesday 11 June, Skye, a specially trained four-year old springer spaniel, detected suspicious scents coming from a locked box attached to the back of a bike outside a local shop.

Skye is part of a new dog patrol service introduced in February as part of Tower Hamlets' £8m Anti-Crime Task Force, a joint effort with the police to tackle crime and disorder.

Thanks to Skye's keen sense of smell, officers were able to seize:

- 233 packets of illicit cigarettes
- 7 packets of smokeless tobacco
- 14 pouches of hand-rolling tobacco
- 4 illegal vapes
- 80 unlicensed Viagra tablets

The discovery was part of a wider two-day crackdown by Tower Hamlets Council.

Free swimming for residents sees participation double

INVESTING IN SERVICES

More than 20,000 residents in Tower Hamlets are swimming for free as the council celebrates the first anniversary of its free swimming programme, a major investment in public health and community wellbeing.

A total of 20,583 residents are now signed up to the scheme. Of those, more than 18,000 are women and girls aged 16 and over, and nearly 3,900 residents aged 55 or over, helping to tackle persistent health inequalities and create more accessible routes into physical activity.

The programme has significantly boosted female participation across the borough's leisure centres, with women and girls now making up 82 per cent of users, up from just over 40 per cent before the scheme launched.

Hussain Rabbani Chowdhury, a local resident said: "I go for my free swim once a week and am really happy it's more accessible.

"I feel like it's helped my health and wellbeing overall, and I feel lighter after my swim – it's improved mobility in my arms and Joanne Barry, a local resident, said: "I'm a carer with my work and an old age pensioner, and I try to keep as active as possible. I thought swimming was more expensive than other activities and it can all add up at the end of the month. I think it's great that it's now free."

At a time when swimming pools are closing nationwide, with 500 pools lost since 2010 and 42 per cent of those closures since 2020, Tower Hamlets is investing in public leisure rather than cutting back.

Younger adults have engaged strongly with the scheme, with more than 3,400 members aged 16-24 and more than 5,700 aged 25-34. An additional 4,448 residents aged 35-44 and more than 3,100 aged 45-54 are also actively participating, showing broad community engagement across all age groups.

Tower Hamlets is protecting and expanding access by also offering free swimming lessons for women and girls to build confidence and skills to support long-term participation.

Tower Hamlets is a borough with poor health, with half of adults either overweight or obese. Women in the borough are more likely to be inactive than men, with women's

life expectancy seven years younger than that of men. Older adults have the lowest rate of physical activity than any other age groups.

The free swimming programme is a core part of the council's commitment to tackling inactivity, reducing health inequalities, and making physical activity more accessible, particularly for residents who face barriers.

Cllr Mohammed Kamrul Hussain, Cabinet Member for Culture and Recreation, said: "In Tower Hamlets, we're taking real action to tackle the deep health inequalities in our communities.

"At a time when access to swimming is vanishing elsewhere, we're proud to be investing in public leisure, making it easier for thousands of residents to be active, healthy and connected.

"This isn't just about swimming, it's about building healthier communities."

The participating schools include Culloden, St Mary's & St Michael's, St John's, The Aldgate School, Faraday, Globe, St Paul's &

St Luke's, Manorfield, and Olga Primary Schools.

Congratulation to Olga Primary School which was the overall winner.

The event was supported by the Tower Hamlets Sports Development Team and Bethnal Green Sharks Swimming Club.

Winners were offered the chance to train with the club, creating a pathway to regional, national, and international success.

New badminton memberships available

Two new badminton membership offers have been launched by Be Well, the council's leisure service, to improve access to the sport for people in Tower Hamlets.

The new 'Be Well Monthly Badminton Membership', priced at

£49 for eight sessions, offers a persession cost of £6.13, while the new 'Be Well 50-Session Badminton Membership', priced at £299, works out to just £5.98 per court session and is valid for a period of 12 months across centres.

With pay and play sessions currently priced at £17.25 for a 60-minute session and £12.80 for a 40-minute session, the new memberships offer flexibility and significant savings for players.

residents, Be Well has introduced new court hire terms and conditions, including checking the photo ID of players at the start of their session.

Ensure you're ready and able to vote

The annual canvass for 2025 has started to ensure that eligible Tower Hamlets electors are entered on the Register of Electors when it's revised and published on Monday I December 2025.

The process involves the existing electoral register data being uploaded into a government portal and compared with databases held by the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) to check

residency and ensure that the right communications are sent to every household in the borough.

The data matching results from DWP are then divided into three types of communication.

Route one: properties receive a letter informing the household that the elector details have matched exactly and a response to update the register is not required. However, if any changes need to be made, this

can be done online, by telephone or SMS (text message) where electors can be added, deleted or amended.

Route two: properties receive a letter informing the household that the data held does not match exactly, and a response is required to confirm who is resident. This can be completed in paper form, SMS, telephone, in person or online and information on how this is completed is included in the letter.

Route three: these are certain properties (such as care homes, residential homes and universities) that have established contacts, and the electoral services team will liaise directly with these establishments rather than send correspondence to ensure the returns are accurate

Please keep an eye out for the correspondence that you will receive and respond accordingly.

Reapply for a postal vote by 31 January

COUNCIL NEWS

Following a change in the law, if an elector wishes to vote by post they can only do so now for a period of three years and a new postal vote application must be made.

The Tower Hamlets electoral services team have been contacting electors who were granted a postal vote before 31 October 2023 to inform them that their postal vote will expire on 31 January 2026, and a new application is required.

This can be done now rather than wait until 31 January 2026

and is very important if you want to continue to vote by post at the Executive Mayor and Local Council elections to be held on Thursday 7 May 2026 and beyond.

Applications can be made online at www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote and paper applications are available from the Tower Hamlets electoral services team.

If an application is not received by the 31 January 2026, the Electoral Registration Officer is required by law to inform all those affected that their postal vote has expired, and they will only be able to vote in person at a polling station until they successfully apply to vote by post again if that method of voting is still required.

When you apply to vote by post you are required to provide your national insurance number, date of birth and signature and when you vote by post you complete and return a "postal vote statement" providing your date of birth and signature again, these known as your "personal identifiers".

The Returning Officer, responsible for administering elections, will check the identifiers against those provided on your application to check that they match. If they do

not match, your postal vote will be rejected and your vote will not be counted, these security checks undertaken to ensure that someone else is not using your vote.

If you are unable to provide a signature or a consistent signature due to a disability or inability to read or write, you can apply for a postal vote without giving your signature.

New resident hub opens with faceto-face access to council services

A COUNCIL THAT LISTENS

Locals have given the thumbs up to a new Residents' Hub located in Bethnal Green, where council services can be accessed face to face.

Residents' Hubs provide support on a wide range of council services from help with filling in your housing benefit or Blue Badge form to paying your council tax and speaking to an advisor to find out if you are missing out on any benefits and employment opportunities.

The council has five Residents' Hub located throughout the borough with the new hub based in Calvert Avenue near the Boundary Estate.

Cllr Kabir Ahmed and Cllr Bodrul Choudhury met with staff to officially open the site.

Mabel who has lived in Bethnal Green for 35 years attended the launch in July.

She said: "I am so pleased we have a Residents' Hub here as I live just round the corner. I much prefer talking to someone face to face.

"I've already spoken to an adviser who has helped me."

So far more than 65,000 visits have been recorded at the hubs since they were introduced in 2023.

The council introduced its first Customer Experience Strategy in 2023 to help ensure residents receive an excellent customer journey no matter which channel they use to get in touch.

Resident Naznin who has been struggling with house bidding used one of the hubs last year and found face to face support invaluable.

Naznin said: "We really appreciated Humaira's ongoing help. We've really struggled for the past year with bidding and she has always tried to help us out at the Town Hall.

"And manager Rahma is very sweet. We can't thank you guys enough for getting it all sorted."

Lutfur Rahman, Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "We are determined to be a council that listens to, and works for, everyone.

"While more and more people are accessing our services digitally, we know some residents do not have access or are unable to use digital devices and channels.

"If you go along to our flagship hub based at the Town Hall you will see it is always busy. There is a clear need for face-to-face service provision.

"That is why we have opened a new hub close to the Boundary Estate, to ensure even greater access to in person support in our borough."

In a bid to be more inclusive and reach out to more residents, the council has introduced a SignLive service for deaf residents at all our hubs.



Since they opened in 2023, there have been 65,000 visits to the hubs

SignLive is an online video interpreting service that provides remote access to qualified British Sign Language (BSL) interpreters.

It allows BSL users to connect with interpreters via video call to facilitate communication with hearing individuals, essentially acting as a bridge between the two.

Cllr Bodrul Choudhury, Cabinet Member for Equalities and Social Inclusion including Customer Services, added: "We have a population of more than 300,000 people and more than 100 languages are used in the borough.

"The demand for council services will continue to grow and we need to be flexible to meet that demand.

"We cannot just push everyone online and need to try to meet everyone's needs."

The council has closed its hub based at the Professional Development Centre in Bethnal Green Road, with the Calvert Avenue site determined to be best placed to meet demand.

Fantastic A-level and GCSE grades for our students

ACCELERATE EDUCATION

Thousands of youngsters are celebrating after receiving their A-Level and GCSE results this summer.

Pupils in Tower Hamlets are improving their A-level results at a faster rate than the England average. Nearly three-quarters (73.4 per cent) of pupils received A* to C grades in their A-levels, a 4.2 per cent increase on last year at 69.2 per cent and higher than the average across England of 1.7 per cent.

Almost one-fifth (18.5 per cent) achieved an A* or A grade, a 2.7 per cent increase compared to 2024.

Great results include the Young Mayor of Tower Hamlets, Fetuma Hassan, who has been accepted into Harvard University to study Government with Economics.

For GCSEs, 82 per cent of students achieved grades 9-4 (equivalent to the old A* to C grades) in English.

In maths, 74 per cent of students achieved grades 9-4.

Lutfur Rahman, Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "Well done to all of our students in Tower Hamlets who have received their results, and a huge thank you to all the teachers and members of staff for their hard work behind the scenes. I'm incredibly proud of the academic talent and drive of our young people. Everyone should be proud of the hard work and effort they've put in throughout the school year, well done."



A fiscal future

Miu Sata, who studied at St Paul's Way Trust Secondary School, got five 9s, two 8s and two 7s in her GCSEs.

She said: "I hope next I'm going to go into sixth form and do maths, psychology and economics. I'm hoping to study economics at university."

Salman Islam, who studied at St Paul's Way Trust Secondary School, got five 9s, two 8s and one 6. He said: "I'm feeling happy. I want to stay here for sixth form and go on to do A-levels in maths, chemistry and economics. After that I'd like to secure an apprenticeship in finance. Today has been a really good experience."

A cleaner boroug

Keeping one of the most visited and densely populated places in the country clean is a continuous challenge for the council's waste services.

With millions of people visiting Tower Hamlets every year, the council must clear up after tourists, and it also faces the challenge of collecting waste and recycling in a place where 87% of properties are flats.

In response to growing issues about the cleanliness of the borough. the council invested an additional £5m a year which has made a significant difference according to the council's latest Annual Residents

More residents are satisfied with street cleaning: 71% compared to 63% in 2024; more residents are satisfied with recycling services: 75% compared to 73% in 2024; and more residents are satisfied with parks and open spaces: 83% compared to 81%

As part of the investment, the council recruited 72 new waste staff, put 22 new vehicles into operation, and expanded the service to deliver

a twice-a-day, seven-day-a-week cleansing on the borough's 115 main streets.

It also relaunched its Find it Fix it app, where residents can report waste, flytipping and graffiti and the council will fix it within 24 hours.

The council launched a new Street Leaders programme where residents can volunteer to report flytipping and litter and organise litter-picks.

Lutfur Rahman, Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "It is not just about extra investment and more services, we are cracking down on any people who harm our community by dumping waste by fining them £1,000 for flytipping and f_{500} for littering.

"Cleaning up flytipping costs about £2m a year - money that could be better spent elsewhere."

Tower Hamlets has the youngest population in London which means support for our young people is more important than ever.

With the increased cost of living, parents told us that it was becoming harder to raise a family and give their children the opportunities they had when they were young.

As a result, the council has invested in supporting young people. It has made a difference

with Ofsted rating the council's Children's Services as 'outstanding' earlier this year.

In early years, the council has kept open, and invested in, its six children's centres to support families.

Then, when they get to school, every child is guaranteed a hot meal after Tower Hamlets became the first local authority in the country in 2023 to offer universal free

school meals in both primary and secondary schools.

On average, it saves a family £550 a year per child.

Since free school meals started in secondary schools, an incredible two million hot meals have been served

Now the council has become the first in the country to offer universal free school uniforms in the first year of primary and secondary schools to

families with household incomes up to £50,350. The scheme is set to benefit 21,000 children over three years.

With applications still open until 30 September, the council has already awarded 2,575 successful applicants over £300,000 in grants.

Help our students have a brighter future

After investing £13.7m, the council has rolled out 19 youth centres. They offer young people after-school activities, young carer services and support for those in care. So far, there have been almost 65,000 visits to the centres. Since July 2023:

- 5,111 sessions held at our youth centres
- 64,900 total attendance in youth centres
- 15 youth centres opened, (21 total including commission providers)

Young Mayor Fetuma Hassan, said: "Youth centres are safe spaces dedicated to young people's needs, offering opportunities to make new friends, develop skills and just have fun."





College and university support

The council is also supporting young people into future vocations, whether they go straight into work after leaving school or want to go into further or higher education.

Since 2022, the council has been offering Education Maintenance Allowance grants of £600 and university bursaries of £1,500 with £1.82 being awarded in 2,350 grants to young people.

As the fastest growing and most densely populated place in the UK, housing is a huge issue for Tower Hamlets' residents.

More than 29,000 residents are on the council's waiting list, with others living in overcrowded or unsuitable homes.

The council's homes programme is on track to exceed its target of delivering 4,000 social rented homes by 2026.

Planning approval has been granted for 2,021 affordable homes, and a total of 9,050 new homes are on the way.

The Mayor's Accelerated Housing Programme will fast-track an additional 3,332 new homes across 37 council-owned sites over the next five years, particularly larger, social rented family-sized and accessible homes The council is also working with Newham Council and the Greater London Authority to deliver 30,000 new homes and new infrastructure in the Lower Lea Valley.

New homes can change lives. Esme moved into her new, accessible council-built home in Bethnal Green last year.

She said: "Since moving into my new fully adapted home, my life has significantly improved. Me and my children are able to enjoy our new environment."

The council is also improving its stock, with \pounds 13.5m of work underway to replace kitchens and bathrooms, test electrical equipment and fit new front doors.

Since the council took over the running of the borough's leisure centres 16 months ago, thousands of residents are feeling the health, wellness and employment benefits.

Tower Hamlets has invested more than £8m developing a holistic health and wellbeing service for residents called Be Well, and upgrading facilities in all six of its leisure centres.

Be Well has welcomed more than 37,000 members and developed targeted activities for women and girls, seeing female participation increase by 40%.

A year ago, the council introduced

a free swimming programme and more than 20,000 residents have signed up, including 18,000 women and girls aged 16+ and nearly 3,000 residents aged over 55.

Joanne Barry, a local resident, said: "I'm a carer and an old age pensioner, and I try to keep as active as possible. I thought swimming was more expensive than other activities and it can all add up at the end of the month. I think it's great that it's now free."

Upgrades to the leisure centres have included renovating the outdoor pitches and the changing village at Mile End, opening women-only gyms at Poplar and Mile End, and improved health suites at Whitechapel and Mile End.

In April, the council reopened London's oldest spa as one of the most affordable in the capital. The York Hall Spa originally opened in 1929.

The spa offers a wide range of concession rates including discounts for public sector workers older adults, those with disabilities and students

In a recent customer survey, 72% of users reported being satisfied or very satisfied with the facilities, including gyms, pools, and

changing rooms.

An Anti-Crime Task Force and a new Drugs Squad have been launched this year as part of £8m worth of new investment to make the borough safer.

The Task Force will provide a greater visible enforcement presence, tackle crime and antisocial behaviour (ASB), and provide increased reassurance to the public.

It includes a new dog patrol service for regular weapons and drugs sweeps in parks, open spaces, and estates. The number of Tower Hamlets Enforcement Officers (THEOs) has almost triped since 2022 to 64. The THEOs patrol the

Tower Hamlets Enforcement Officers:

- 64 THEO roles in total
- 415 arrests by council funded police officers since April 2022.
- 30,000 hours of patrols in 2025.
- Issued over 1,000 fixed penalty notices so far this year

streets, tackling crime, ASB, and providing community reassurance.

The funding also includes a £895,000 upgrade the council's CCTV control room, with state-of-the-art LED video wall display unit capable of monitoring 42 cameras simultaneously. All 350 street-based cameras have been upgraded from analogue to digital.

The investment is already paying dividends with a 31% increase in arrests supported by CCTV. A further £3.8 million is being spent to expand CCTV coverage across council estates.

The council also funds 26 Metropolitan Police officers to work in the borough – more than any other London council.

The newly launched Drugs Squad combines enforcement with tailored support, offering a unique approach to tackling substance misuse and anti-social behaviour. Since mid-June, the Drugs Squad has delivered 945 hours of visible patrols in drug hotspots and referred 49 people to specialist support services.

Lutfur Rahman, Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "We are investing £8 million, more than any other local authority in London, leading the way in showing how councils can invest to make our communities safer.

"Our Anti Crime Task Force works closely with police partners to ensure that there is a visible on-street presence across the borough, acting as a deterrent to those engaging in crime and antisocial behaviour."

Community engagement remains a priority, including regular women's safety walkabouts, and an engagement bus raising awareness of high-volume crimes like bike and phone thefts.

It also provides opportunities for residents to speak to their local Safer Neighbourhood Operations team, report any issues and seek



advice.

Thousands of children once again benefited over the Summer holidays from the Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme, managed by the council working with local voluntary and community groups.

The clubs give children a nutritious meal and provide them with the opportunity to enjoy activities such as sports and games, art, music and drama, as well as special day trips.

In partnership with 36 local organisations and funded by the Department for Education, Tower Hamlets Summer HAF clubs provided more than 35,000 places and free meals for young people aged 4-16 to attend during the school holidays.

Isa Goni, 12, said of one of the activities organised by London Jaguars: "At London Jaguars, all the coaches made me feel welcome and never let me down. Even on days when I wasn't in the mood, I always ended up having a great time. This is an experience I will never forget."

A parent added: "My children always return home full of joy, excitement, and wonderful stories to share.

"Thank you to the whole London Jaguars team. My children always look forward to attending your holiday clubs, and I feel completely reassured knowing they are safe, happy, and thriving in your care."

Cllr Saied Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Resources and the Cost of Living, visited the HAF club ran by London Jaguars at Bartlett Park.

He said: "It was great to spend some time with the young people who really enjoyed their time at the club, taking part in sports and fitness activities, as well as having the chance to have fun days out and make new friends. I know that their positive experiences will have been shared by young people across the borough who attended HAF clubs delivered by our communuity partners."

HAF clubs are free for qualifying children and run at different school holiday times throughout the year, with places prioritised for children in receipt of benefits related free school meals.

Hundreds of women have taken part in a consultation to make the borough a fairer place and tackle gender inequalities.

The survey, led by the council's Women's Commission, asked for views on key issues including health, safety, employment and leadership.

In addition to the survey, the

commission ran 10 focus groups over the summer, with more planned ahead, in partnership with community organisations.

The commission listened to testimonials and held deeper conversations about safety in public spaces, pathways to leadership, and experiences around employment and health.

The focus groups were met with positive feedback. One participant

said: "All voices were heard and welcomed in a safe and encouraging environment.

"The session was relaxed, and all were respectful giving us the chance to have our opinion and voices heard."

Four public reviews will take place from September to December where the commission will present the findings from the survey to key decision makers.

The commissioners will hold decision makers to account, hearing their responses to the findings, and using this information to inform recommendations for the Commission's Report, launching in early 2026.

£2m to support students with learning

Around £2million is being given to up to 2,000 students in Tower Hamlets to help them continue their studies at university and college from September.

Tower Hamlets Council has two schemes to help with the cost of further learning, including the Education Maintenance Allowance (EMAs), a £600 payment to eligible students to support them with their studies, and the University Bursary Award, a £1,500 payment to eligible students to support them with costs associated with their undergraduate studies, including accommodation,

books and resources.

For the first time since the council reinstated the programme in 2022, it will be awarding the full allocation of 1,250 EMAs.

It has also awarded all 800 University Bursary Award grants, doubling last year's total of 400.

Since the relaunch of the EMA and University Bursary Scheme in 2022, the council has distributed £1.92 million in grants, and, due to an increase in funding, it will be awarding a further £2 million in the current funding round. See more on the council's website.

2,000 new electric vehicle chargers

CLEAN AND GREEN

The first of 2,000 new on-street residential electric vehicle (EV) charging points have been installed across Tower Hamlets by the council.

The project, which is being delivered in partnership with ubitricity, is a key component of the borough's commitment to reducing emissions and improving air quality, following its declaration of a climate emergency in March 2019.

The charge points will be installed in existing lampposts, helping local residents to conveniently charge their vehicles closer to their homes.

The installation will also cause minimal disruption as they only take thirty minutes to install into current infrastructure.

The charge points will be installed on a ward-by-ward basis, starting with Bow East, Island Gardens and Whitechapel. All 2,000 charging points will be installed by early 2026.

Beyond enhancing EV accessibility, the project brings wider benefits to the community. As part of the contract, ubitricity,

in collaboration with Shell UK, has committed to providing apprenticeship placements to upskill Tower Hamlets residents. Funding will support training for intermediate, advanced, and higher-level apprenticeships throughout the 10-year agreement.

With more than 9,200 public charge points already in operation, ubitricity will supply, install, own, operate, maintain, and manage the new infrastructure on behalf of Tower Hamlets Council.

Lutfur Rahman, Executive Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "As part of our commitment to becoming a net zero borough and tackling the climate emergency, expanding sustainable travel options is essential.

"We know that more residents and businesses are switching to electric vehicles. Tower Hamlets has more than 5,400 registered plug-in vehicles, which represents an increase of over 200 per cent from the previous 4-years.

"With 93 per cent of homes lacking off-street parking, public charging infrastructure is vital. Our ambition is to build a comprehensive electric vehicle charging network in

our borough so that no residents are more than a three-minute walk from an electric charging point."

Stuart Wilson, UK Managing Director of ubitricity, said: "We're proud to work on this groundbreaking project alongside the London Borough of Tower Hamlets to expand access to EV charging across the community."

In addition to these 2,000 new chargers being delivered, the council is working to deliver an additional thirty-five rapid charging points over the next twelve months.

New jet wash team giving borough a deep clean

A new jet washing service has been launched by Tower Hamlets Council to give our streets a deeper clean, helping to remove grime and stains.

The service started earlier this summer as part of the council's wider commitment to cleaner, safer, and more welcoming public spaces for everyone.

Jet washing uses high-pressure water to clean areas that regular street sweeping can't reach.

The team is focusing on highfootfall areas such as street markets, town centres, and locations near schools and hospitals - places where litter and mess build up more quickly.

By targeting these key spots, the jet washing service is making a visible difference to the look and feel of our streets.

This work supports the council's wider efforts to maintain high standards of cleanliness and improve quality of life for residents, businesses, and visitors.

£700,000 in Pension Credit claimed

More than £700,000 in Pension Credit has been claimed since the council launched its Credit Where Credit is Due campaign last winter.

Data from the council revealed more than 4,000 households in the borough are missing out on payments worth on average $f_{3,900}$ a year.

Pension Credit can also unlock access to a range of support including:

- · Free TV licence if you're 75 or over
- · Help with NHS costs such as

prescriptions, dental treatment, glasses and transport costs for hospital appointments

• Access to the winter government Winter Fuel Payment scheme

The council is working with LinkAge Plus to increase take up of Pension Credit. LinkAge Plus offers a range of activities, one-on-one support, and access to information and advice. The program operates out of five hubs in the borough.

Cllr Saied Ahmed, Cabinet Member for Resources and Cost of Living, added: "We will continue

to work with our partners to reach more residents and our approach is working. Since November, 181 households have claimed Pension Credit. Just click on the Pension Credit Calculator and see what you are entitled to."

To claim, call the Pension Credit helpline on 0800 99 1234 or apply online at www.gov.uk/pensioncredit. You will need the following information ready:

- · Your National Insurance number
- Information about your income, savings and investments

- The details for the account you want the payment to go to
- You can check whether you are eligible using the Pension Credit Calculator

If you need help using the calculator, or want to speak to an advisor, please call 020 7364 5040.

If you require face-to-face support with applying for Pension Credit, our Resident Support Outreach Team is here to help. You can contact them and book an appointment by emailing LBTHResidentSupport@ towerhamlets.gov.uk.

Residents are being asked for their views to help shape the borough's budget for 2026/7.

Around half of the council budget is spent on supporting children and

vulnerable adults. The council has continued to invest in important frontline services such as housing, communuity safety and waste and recycling.

There also continues to be financial support for families including £1m a year for school clothing grants for families with household incomes of up to £50,350.

The event recognised schools

Take control of your health

A new network of health kiosks has launched across four locations in Tower Hamlets this week, giving residents easy access to free, selfservice health checks and tools to help them monitor their wellbeing.

Tower Hamlets Public Health team has commissioned SiSU Health to provide the self-service kiosks, which are located at Idea Stores Bow, Chrisp Street and Watney Market, and Mile End Leisure Centre.

Cllr Sabina Akhtar, Cabinet Member for Health, Wellbeing, and Social Care, and Cllr Kamrul Hussain, Cabinet Member for Culture and Recreation, visited Idea Store Chrisp Street in Poplar to officially launch the initiative.

Based in community locations, the health kiosks give residents easy access to information about their health, which they can use to seek lifestyle advice and reduce their chance of developing long-term conditions.

In less than five minutes, the kiosks can measure blood pressure, BMI (weight & height), smoking status, Alcohol Dependency Score (AUDIT), stress levels, heart rate, and body fat percentage

Cllr Maium Talukdar, Deputy Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "We are pleased to introduce this simple but critical initiative, bringing personal health checks directly to residents in the communities where they live and work.

"Making health checks accessible and convenient is a proactive step towards reducing the risk of more serious health conditions, so we can empower our community to live longer, healthier lives."

Cllr Sabina Akhtar, Cabinet Member for Health, Wellbeing, and Social Care, said: "By regularly using the kiosks, residents can learn about their wellbeing, keep track of any changes, get tailored lifestyle advice, and find out where to get local support in Tower Hamlets.

These steps will help reduce chances of developing longterm health conditions such as cardiovascular disease and diabetes."

The kiosks provide tips on improving health based on results, including dietary suggestions, exercise tips, and signposting to local healthcare and healthy lifestyle services. They also provide copies

Protect yourself from illness this winter

Cold weather brings a higher risk of viruses such as flu and Covid-19, which can cause serious complications for older people and those with underlying health conditions. The NHS is offering free winter vaccinations to those most at

risk.

You are eligible for a free flu vaccine if you are: aged 65 or over, pregnant, have certain long-term health conditions, are resident in a care home, or are a frontline health or social care worker. Children

aged 2–16 are also eligible, as well as carers and anyone in close contact with people who have a weakened immune system.

The Covid-19 seasonal vaccine is available for: adults aged 75 and over, residents in care homes for

older adults, and those aged six months and over with a weakened immune system.

Looking at barriers to healthy living

HEALTH

Nine workshops brought residents and key stakeholders together to look at the barriers to people staying healthy within the borough.

Tower Hamlets Health
Determinants Research
Collaboration (HDRC) supports
research about how the council can
help residents stay healthy.

The HDRC is a new team and is working with residents to decide what research topics are most important to them.

Across the summer, the HDRC hosted nine workshops bringing together residents, council staff, university researchers, and stakeholders to look at the different things that keep people healthy such as housing, income, education and the environment.

Residents were at the centre of the first six workshops. Through interactive activities, open conversations and voting exercises, residents identified and prioritised the key issues affecting their daily lives and wellbeing.

Top concerns included the rising cost of living, barriers to employment, crime and antisocial behaviour, and limited access to services and activities.

Many people shared how these challenges negatively impact both physical and mental health.

Working in small groups, residents co-produced four new HDRC research themes to sit alongside the previously established focus on housing.

The resulting five themes are: opportunities for residents, staying physically and mentally healthy, crime and safety, economic security

and support and housing.

Housing remains a central issue, particularly problems like damp, mould, and overcrowding.

Residents contributed rich personal insights throughout, highlighting the importance of lived experience in driving meaningful research.

In the final three workshops, residents came together with council leaders, researchers, health professionals, and people from community organisations.

These sessions helped build a shared understanding of community priorities and how they align with ongoing work. They also highlighted areas where further research is needed.

The workshops reinforced the value of co-production, working together to shape research with community knowledge and

collective problem-solving.

Feedback was overwhelmingly positive.

Residents and partners alike appreciated the opportunity to connect, be heard, and influence future research directions.

As a result of the sessions, the HDRC will:

- Conduct research in partnership with the council, universities and community organisations within the areas residents chose
- Work closely with the community
- Share ideas with other local authorities and organisations
- Help improve local services and council decisions

Residents also provided thoughtful suggestions on how HDRC could improve the way it communicates its work to the public, providing a meaningful look into how engagement can drive better transparency and understanding.

A resident who attended the workshop said: "I thoroughly enjoyed working and engaging with the residents of Tower Hamlets.

"It played a vital role in ensuring residents' voices are heard in local decision-making."

900 years of public transport

HISTORY

The history of public transport in Tower Hamlets over the past 900 years is in the spotlight for a new exhibition at the Local History Library and Archives.

Next Stop: 900 years of public transport in Tower Hamlets is in the entrance hall of the local history library on Bancroft Road.

The display tells the fascinating story of public transport in the East End over nine centuries, spanning the construction of the Bow Bridge in the 12th century, the opening of the Elizabeth Line in the 21st, with Victorian innovations in steam- and electricity-powered travel in between.

Showcasing more than 100 unique items selected from the collections of Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives, the exhibition documents many changes and evolutions in public transport.

In addition to archival items from the collections, vibrant colour drawings of those original images have been commissioned from illustrator Jane Smith, which are displayed at child's eye height.

This twin approach to the display enables visitors of all ages to learn about long vanished modes of transport, from George Shillibeer's Omnibus in the 1800s to the trolleybus in the 1930s.

The exhibition also includes firsthand testimonies of people who have used or worked on different forms of public transport, past and present.

Through newspaper cuttings, photographs, maps, oral history



recordings and creative work, **Next Stop** aims to share both personal and archival knowledge about the history of public transport in the East End.

This is the first exhibition at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives designed for both adults and children. An illustrated timeline, interactive games and artwork by local school pupils are all included. A free illustrated map of the borough's disused train stations is also available to take away!

We all connect with public transport in some way - it could be as simple as catching a bus, or even dodging one on our walking or cycling commutes. The need for, and use of, public transport has been a constant throughout the many centuries of change in Tower Hamlets.

Its significance persists as we contemplate the future sustainability of the planet we live on. **Next Stop** is free to visit and on display until 21 February 2026. A full programme of events to tie in with it is being organised.


