The country's oldest lollipop man has retired at 93 after helping people cross the road for 25 years.

Frank Smith was stationed on Manchester Road, helping pupils stopping, but one or two were and their parents cross the road to get to Cubitt Town Primary School.

Frank said: "I have really enjoyed being a lollipop man, especially meeting everyone and talking to them all – the kids, the parents, the teachers and everyone else.

"Everyone stops for a chat and knows me.

"Sometimes someone will stop and they ask me if I remember them as I helped them cross the road when they were young and now they are 21.

"Sometimes I remember them and sometimes I don't, but I always say I do."

He added that it was a pleasure to

help people cross the road and that retire after 25 years. there were no accidents on the road while he was on duty.

Frank said: "It can be a very busy road, especially around school time when people come tearing down it.

"Most people were good at impatient.

"The worst people were usually the cyclists, and they got stopped by the police a few times as they didn't know there was a police car waiting for them just after the crossing."

In recognition of his service, Frank was given a plaque and special commendation at the Tower Hamlets Council Staff Awards.

Frank said: "I was quite surprised to get the award.

"It was really nice and the Mayor was there with all the other council staff."

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Warning as crackdown on social housing fraud begins

HOMES FOR THE FUTURE

TWO hundred and seventy-five reports of suspected social housing fraud were investigated by Tower Hamlets Council in the financial year 2021-2022.

Following these investigations, 33 social housing properties were recovered, seven Right to Buy applications were prevented, and one person was convicted of fraud.

The council is under ever increasing pressure to provide social housing, so it is essential that homes go to people who are legally entitled to them. If you are on the waiting list, you will wait even longer if homes are allocated to people who have no right to be there. There are currently more than 24,000 househoulds on the council's housing register and London is currently in a housing crisis.

Examples of tenancy fraud include when a person knowingly provides false information on their application; subletting fraud; or succession fraud, which is when a person moves into a property after the legal tenant dies or moves away, but they are eligible.

Avoid housing scams

If anyone ever approaches you asking for money to secure a council home, it is a scam:

- Never hand over money if approached by someone claiming to be a council officer
- If you are approached in and around the town hall, report it to the council's Facilities Management staff immediately
- Council officers would never ask for money to deal with housing applications
- Report all approaches or requests for money to the police.

Landlord fined £8,000 for misleading tenants

A rogue landlord who admitted misleading tenants on their rights and threatening them to leave has been ordered to pay $f_{8,000}$.

Four residents complained to Tower Hamlets Council's Environmental Health and Trading Standards Team about London Corporate Apartments Ltd in late 2017 to early 2018.

The company had issued licences to occupy, rather than assured short-hold tenancies, which meant the tenants were misled as to their rights to have their tenancy deposit protected, and their rights as to their status as tenants, and were at risk of illegal eviction.

There were also complaints that aggressive tactics were used to intimidate two of the complainants into leaving their properties.

Khaled Abed-Alrazek, director of London Corporate Apartments Ltd, pleaded guilty to two counts of misleading actions and one of aggressive commercial practice relating to his tenants from February 2017 to May 2018.

He was fined $f_{2,000}$ for the company's aggressive commercial practices and $f_{1,800}$ for issuing

licences rather than tenancy agreements.

He also had to pay compensation for the two deposits that weren't returned, worth $\pounds_{I,255}$, and must pay a further \pounds_{285} compensation to one victim in respect of the aggressive commercial practice, in what the judge described as "a terrifying experience at the hands of bullies acting in [Abed's] name".

He was also ordered to pay a contribution of $f_{3,000}$ towards prosecution costs. The company has since been dissolved.

During the case, District Judge

Matthew Bone also commended Tower Hamlets Council for its work to get the case to court, which was significantly impacted by the Covid pandemic and other issues.

He said: "I take this opportunity to thank the local authority for the way they've gone about prosecuting this case. I've reviewed the history. I only see now how difficult it has been to bring them. The local authority has impressed me as being patient, diligent and professional."

Block of 17 new affordable flats unveiled

Chris Braithwaite House ranges from five to eight storeys and comprises 17 one, two, three, and four-bedroom flats for social rent.

Kawsar Ahmad and family are one of the first to move in from an overcrowded flat in Shadwell. Mr Ahmad said: "It's a very

nice property. "Before we had just two

bedrooms and were very overcrowded.

"It was difficult for my children to study, but now they have the space to do so."

Free school meals for every Tower Hamlets child

INVESTING IN SERVICES

Nearly 38,000 young people across Tower Hamlets will benefit from free school meals after the council became the first in England to offer them to all school pupils up to the age of 16.

The council has funded free school meals for all primary school children since 2014, and the extension to

secondary schools will be rolled out in phases from September 2023.

Eating a healthy, nutritious meal supports pupils with their learning and has been shown to improve behaviour and academic achievements.

With nearly half of children in Tower Hamlets going into secondary school with excess weight, the scheme is also a positive step towards improving the physical health of young people and promoting a healthier borough.

It will also provide vital support during the cost-of-living crisis, saving families an average of £550 per year, per child. £5.7m was included in the council's 2023/24 budget to extend universal free school meals funding from all primary to all secondary school pupils.

A new youth service to help children reach their full potential will include a youth space in every ward.

The council has invested £13.7m to redesign the service in Tower Hamlets, which has the youngest population in the country and some of the highest child poverty rates.

It forms part of a wider £19m council investment in young people. The investment in Young Tower Hamlets (YTH) will provide free opportunities for young people to improve their skills and unleash their creativity, alongside safe spaces for those who need it.

During May, 400 young people took part in a series of four interactive 'Hackathon' events featuring workshops to design their future youth service, including the new YTH branding.

There will be ongoing opportunities for young people to shape the new service.

The launch event, hosted by 17-year-old Zaynah Alom, Chair of Tower Hamlets' Youth Council, featured a welcome from Tower Hamlets social media influencers Iksy and Char Avell, activities for young people including sports sessions from West Ham United Football Club and London Warriors, arts and crafts, music and drama, and the unveiling of the new brand.

Young Tower Hamlets kicked off with a packed, free summer programme as part of the council's Summer of Fun, which included careers workshops, performance arts, cooking classes, arts and crafts, sports, trips out and more.

Tahmid Hussen, Young Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "Young people have been part of this journey.

"This new youth service will be

a legacy that will empower the youth and the upcoming generation.

"They are the ones that will benefit the most and will be building, shaping and structuring this new youth service."

GCSE and A Level success

Students in Tower Hamlets have despite the pandemic. achieved great success in their A Levels and GCSEs.

Almost three-quarters (70.5 per cent) of students achieved an A* to improvement of one per cent C grade in their A Levels.

Almost one-fifth (18.1 per cent) achieved an A* or A grade, an increase of 1.6 per cent compared to 2019, which is the last year students sat exams.

Over half of those who entered BTECs in Tower Hamlets achieved all grades at Distinction and above, which is approximately 13 per cent the Covid pandemic, when students above the England average.

In their GCSEs, Tower Hamlets' average score was 1.5 points above the 2019 average score of 49.8, showing that results have improved

grades 9-4 in English (equivalent to the old A* to C grades), a slight compared to 2019. In maths, 77 per cent of students achieved grades 9-4, up three per cent on the comparable figure in 2019.

Nationally, pass rates have fallen for a second year running.

The fall in passes is due to the plan to bring grades back down, after a spike in top results during were given grades by their teachers. instead of sitting exams.

Lutfur Rahman, Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "Education is one of our top priorities and we are



investing heavily to ensure that all 85 per cent of students achieved young people can reach their full potential.

Helping our care leavers get support not discrimination

A brave group of people who have been in care have called on Tower Hamlets Council to help other care leavers 'thrive and not just survive' during an emotional cabinet meeting.

The council has now agreed to protect those who have been in care from stigma and discrimination once they leave by making being in care a protected characteristic in all council decisions.

It is against the law to discriminate against someone because of a protected characteristic.

individuals Care-experienced often encounter significant barriers to employment, housing and socially, leading to mental health issues, a higher chance of being involved in crime and poverty, and social exclusion.

Three people who have left care

spoke about their own experiences at a Cabinet meeting.

Jade, who has since graduated with a first and now works for a large advertising company, said: "Being taken into care meant that my childhood was disrupted.

"I missed two of the most formative years of primary school and my SATs were never taken.

"As a result, my predicted GCSE grades were dishearteningly low and I found myself placed in the bottom set for all subjects. It took a lot of persuasion and many meetings between the school and my social workers and carers to get them to give me the chance in middle and upper sets so that I could achieve my full potential.

"Without that chance, I might not have secured the grades I needed for A Levels, attended university or

obtained the job I hold today. "Yet not all children in care have

been as fortunate as I have been.

"Many lack advocates. This is why we must ensure care

experience becomes a protected characteristic.

"With this recognition, they can not just catch up, but excel in their education."

Bursaries helping university aspirations

A total of 400 students have received financial support for their university study through the Mayor's University Bursary Award .

Eligible students can apply for a $f_{1,500}$ payment to support with costs associated with their undergraduate studies, including accommodation, books and resources.

A total of f_{600} was on offer to support students in the first year.

Recipients of the funding have spoken of how helpful it has been.

Tawsiful Islam, who is going into his third and final year studying Economics at the University of Warwick, said: "Receiving a university bursary is a recognition of my intellectual promise and strength.

"I will feel more confident and motivated to excel in my studies and other interests as a result of this acknowledgment."

Nazifa Islam, a first-year medicine student at Oxford, who is aiming to become a doctor, said: "I looked into doing internships, but they weren't well paid, and you have to pay for travel, accommodation and food.

"I would not have been able to do internships without the university bursary - I also wouldn't have been able to afford some of the textbooks that I need for my course."

Fatema, who has almost finished the bursary I received was really her degree in Health and Social Care at Anglia Ruskin University in London, said: "After Covid, the price of everything went up and

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New mural in Bethnal Green

A new public art piece by artist Shiraz Bayjoo has been unveiled in Globe Town, Bethnal Green.

Installed on the side of Clynes House in July 2023, the work is a large colourful photographic collage.

Funded by Tower Hamlets Council and delivered in partnership with Whitechapel Gallery, the mural combines over twenty different images sourced from archives around London and internationally.

The images reflect a range of different historical themes that have been vital in the development of the local area, including protests and political movements; trade, industry and empire; and sporting, cultural and ecological references.

Shiraz Bayjoo's proposal for the site was selected by a public vote and the final design draws upon discussions between Bayjoo and the Globe Town community.

Shiraz is a Mauritian artist living in London.


He said: "I wanted to highlight the area's history and far-reaching legacies - the refuge given to countless generations escaping political persecution, and the grassroots movements that have gone on to shape Britain and the world."

Cllr Abdul Wahid, Lead Member for Jobs, Skills and Growth, said: "Globe Town is a fantastic area with a rich history that is of great importance to our residents. This striking new mural is part of broader works that our High Streets Team is delivering to improve the Globe Town market square.

"To date, we've delivered shopfront improvements to seven units, two murals, CCTV in Meath Gardens, and public realm updates that include tree planting, seating, and new lighting."

Charge safe to prevent fires

The Mayor of Tower Hamlets has written to the Secretary of State to call for greater government support after a 60 per cent increase in e-bikes and e-scooter fires in London.

In February, two e-bike fires ripped through two flats in 37 hours and, since the start of 2023, there has been, on average, one e-bike or e-scooter battery-related fire a month in Tower Hamlets.

The letter calls for funding for local authorities to create safe charging spaces, improved legislation, more robust sampling and examination on importation of lithium batteries, including a national registration body for businesses providing them, and greater research into the issue.

The letter was sent alongside the

launch of a multi-channel marketing campaign, #ChargeSafe Tower Hamlets, which has been managed by Tower Hamlets Council and is supported by London Fire Brigade.

Lutfur Rahman, Mayor of Tower Hamlets, said: "It is evident that the rise in e-bike and e-scooter battery fires shows no signs of slowing down. These batteries present a major threat to not only our residents' lives, but people in neighbouring boroughs and across the UK.

"We are doing what we can as a local council, but we need greater government support to protect and save lives in Tower Hamlets and across the country. That is why I am calling on the Home Office to support local authorities in managing this emerging threat."

- Never leave your bike or scooter charging while you are asleep or not around
- Unplug your charger once it's finished charging
- Always use the correct charger for your batteries

Your views on Community Language Service

A new service will see free language classes for young people in Tower Hamlets.

The council is looking to introduce the Community Language Service for people aged between four and 18 in November 2023.

Community languages are the languages that are spoken by members of a minority community group within a majority language context.

In Tower Hamlets, English is the

main spoken language however other languages include Bengali, Italian and Spanish.

Language barriers can lead to challenges in areas such as literacy and language development in school.

Fines for unsafe masks and underage sales



Residents were encouraged to wear face masks during the pandemic

A Tower Hamlets company has been fined $\pounds_{34,000}$ and the company director handed a suspended sentence after it sold face masks and hand sanitiser during the pandemic which did not give enough protection against Covid.

Tower Hamlets Council's Trading Standards found in July 2020 that Posh Fashion Ltd, in Whitechurch Lane, E1, was selling hand sanitiser which only contained 35 per cent ethanol, nearly half of the required level of 60-80 per cent for effective germ killing. The labelling indicated it contained 75 per cent ethanol.

The face masks the shop was selling were also found to not meet the appropriate standards.

The company and its director, Khalil Ullah Zarguly, each pleaded guilty to three offences of misleading commercial practices, contrary to the Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations 2008, and appeared at Snaresbrook Crown Court on 13 July for sentencing.

The company was fined $f_{34,000}$ and Mr Zarguly was sentenced to 34 weeks' custody, suspended for 12 months, and he will have to complete 60 hours of community service within twelve months. He and the company were also jointly ordered to pay $f_{21,000}$ in costs.

Non-compliant face masks purchased by the company had previously been seized at Heathrow, which had led to the visit by Trading Standards.

In addition, Mr. Zarguly had also previously received a warning from Trading Standards about the need to ensure that products he sold were legally compliant and given advice on the steps that could be taken.

Hundreds of weapons and knives taken off our streets

FIGHT CRIME

610 knives and 79 other weapons have been taken off our streets in six months thanks to four new knife amnesty bins.

The bins, installed by charity Word4Weapons, allow people to dispose of knives and other weapons anonymously and safely. The knives are destroyed and are not investigated by the police.

The bins were unveiled in January in Barnet Grove, north of the Bethnal Green Road junction, E2 6AD; Vallance Road opposite Underwood Road, EI 5BQ; Burslem Street between the recycling bins, EI 2LL; and Brownfield Street next to number 107, EI4 6ND.

The bins were emptied at the end of June. The other weapons alongside the knives included scissors, kitchen knives and utensils, knuckledusters, swords, and DIY tools.

Cllr Abu Talha Chowdhury, Cabinet Member for Safer Communities, said: "Tower Hamlets is largely a safe place to live, work and visit, but like all London boroughs, we do sadly see some knife crime.

"People carrying knives on our streets is illegal and will not be tolerated.

"These amnesty bins take dangerous weapons off our streets and prevent them being used to harm anyone.

"Each knife taken off our streets is potentially a life saved."

If you want to dispose of a knife or other sharp weapon, please wrap it in several layers of cardboard or newspaper and secure it with plenty of sticky tape so that the blade is completely protected and the knife cannot easily be removed, before placing it in a secure cardboard box.

It's an offence to have a knife in a public place and there aren't many reasonable excuses for having one.

If you are depositing a knife in one of the amnesty bins, please make sure that it is safely wrapped.

More cars seized in blue badge crackdown

Seven cars were impounded during a day of action in which more than 100 blue badges were checked across Tower Hamlets.

Blue badges allow those with a disability or health condition to park closer to their destination. However, sadly, some people steal blue badges to sell on or use themselves, or they are sometimes used fraudulently.

The council's Parking and Mobility

Day of action after residents raise concerns

More than 2,000 cigarettes have been seized, stolen motorbikes recovered and a number of fines and warnings issued during a day of action in Tower Hamlets.

Council teams, along with Tower Hamlets Enforcement Officers, our Police Partnership Task Force and the Whitechapel neighbourhood Police, visited Vine Court, EI, after complaints from residents about drug dealing, anti-social behaviour, fly tipping, noise nuisance and poor parking.

The day, coordinated by the council's ASB and Community Safety Team, resulted in a number of shops being searched by Trading Standards and the seizure of 2,353 illicit non-UK or counterfeit cigarettes from one shop and smaller quantities from others.

The Environmental Services Team fined a business for fly tipping and

the Highways Team secured the removal of two bicycles which were left carelessly.

Three suspected stolen motorbikes were recovered by the Parking Enforcement Team and the Specialist Substance Misuse Investigations Team engaged with four vulnerable people.

Chief Inspector Claire Horgan said: "Officers from the Partnership Task Force and neighbourhood wards assisted the local authority in their day of action in Tower Hamlets.

"Officers provided assistance to all departments during the day while also reassuring the local community who have been affected by these criminal activities in Vine Court for too long."

The council will continue to act on reports of ASB and other issues.

Hundreds of residents, businesses and visitors were given crime prevention advice and helped with their anti-social behaviour concerns during a week of targeted activity

More than 40 hours of events were carried out by our Safer Neighbourhood Operations Team along with our partners including Met Police to mark Anti-Social Behaviour Awareness Week from 3-9 July.

Highlights from the activity included a responsible dog ownership event in Victoria Park, weapon sweeps, patrols in areas noted by residents as being ASB hotspots, and engagement events across the borough.

More than 1,000 residents and 186 businesses were engaged with during the week. 16 drug users were also approached, with ten being referred for further help.



If you've just received your exam results and you're not sure what to do next, Tower Hamlets Young WorkPath may be able to help.

Young WorkPath is a council service that works with young people aged between 13 and 19, or up to age 25 if they have special educational needs or a disability.

It provides careers information, advice and guidance about the next steps available to young people.

For young people no longer in education, the service can support you in making choices about your future, and will also help you to find jobs and apprenticeships, and support with application forms, CVs and interview techniques.

Young person Maniul spoke to Young WorkPath in 2022 after receiving his results and is now doing a Data Analyst Degree Apprenticeship at Amazon. He said: "Working with Amin [from Young WorkPath] was of great benefit.

"He helped me make a really good CV that was catered to the career field I was applying for.

"He also helped me with my cover letter which I was able to use as a base for the interview questions."

Eastenders Pie and Mash has been serving customers since 1976, and the now owner, Brian Boulter, took over the business in 2010.

The shop is located on London's famous Chrisp Street Market and uses local produce - the meat for the pies comes in directly from Smithfield Meat Market every day.

Brian said: "The pandemic was difficult but we're finding the cost-of-living crisis even more challenging. Our electricity bills have tripled, flour has doubled and a large tub of margarine that in 2019 was £10.50 is now £27. The area is more diversified now, and there is more competition, but it's clear that pie and mash remains important.'

Brian applied for Tower Hamlets Council's free business training in March and was accepted onto the course in the same month. The programme delivers support to businesses looking to develop an existing or new income stream.

He said: "The team has given use it personally and I think if you have it and use it in your own life, you're more likely to use it for your business.

"The team come and see me every couple of weeks. We sit down and go through what I need to do, they make it really easy. They're great and they do convince me that social media is going to work for us. They're teaching me a lot and that's why it is so good, I wouldn't do it otherwise."

Brian's training includes learning how to harness Google My Business, Facebook, Instagram and using scheduling platforms such as Loomly to drive awareness for the shop.

Applications for the second cohort of the programme are now open. All the business training is bespoke and can be done one-toone or online and at a time and pace that is suitable.

Significant changes affecting elections, electoral registration, voting systems and the borough's

parliamentary constituency boundaries are taking place, with further changes to be introduced over the next 18 months to two years.

Eligible residents should ensure

they are registered to vote correctly, have the appropriate approved photographic identification if they plan to vote in person in the polling station, and understand how these changes will affect them. • You can find out more information at towerhamlets.gov.uk/elections

You need to show approved photo ID at your polling station before voting

Voters are required to show approved photographic ID when voting in person at a polling station in some elections to verify their identity before voting.

This includes local elections and by-elections, UK parliamentary by-elections and recall petitions and, from October 2023, will also apply to UK general elections.

Accepted approved forms of photo ID include but are not limited to:

- A passport issued in the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state, or a Commonwealth country
- A driving licence issued in the UK, Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state
- Some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass or an Oyster 60+ card
- An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a 'PASS' card).

Voters will not need to show photo ID to apply to vote by post or

proxy. Although anyone acting as a proxy to vote on someone's behalf will need to show their own photo ID at the polling station.


If you don't have any of the approved photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC) at www.gov.uk/apply-forphoto-id-voter-authority-certificate

To apply for a VAC, you must be registered to vote, provide a photograph, and may need to provide identification before a Voter Authority Certificate will be issued.

Extensive training of staff and preparatory work is taking place and includes additional measures being put in place such as providing privacy areas if anyone attending the polling place wishes to have their photographic ID checked in private.

Don't lose your right to vote

The council's Electoral Registration Officer (ERO) is currently updating the electoral register which ensures the register has accurate information about the eligible electorate in the borough, so they don't lose their right to vote.

With the Mayor of London and London Assembly elections taking place on Thursday 2 May 2024, and a general election due no later than 28 January 2025, this is an important opportunity for those eligible to vote to make sure they can take part.

Recent home movers are urged to check their details are up to date.

The annual electoral register update will run until November 2023, with the revised electoral register published no later than 1 December 2023.

The first stage of the process has concluded with the electoral register data uploaded to the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) to be matched against their records.

If all the people registered to vote at a property match the records held by DWP the property falls into a category known as Route I and the ERO will send an email, if the council holds an email address for someone in the household, to confirm that the details we hold for the property are correct.

If there isn't an email address, the ERO will send a form (CCA) to the property and if no changes are needed there is no need to reply. If there are any people at the property that have not matched with the DWP records these fall into a different category Route 2 and a form CCB (or canvass form) will be sent which will require completion and a return made.

You must respond to this form even if there are no changes to make. If the ERO does not receive a response, further attempts will be made to get a response from you, including sending reminder forms or visiting your property.

The final category, Route 3, relates to care homes, student accommodation, Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMOs) and all other properties where the ERO has established a contact such as a Duty Manager, who will be responsible for providing the correct and updated information.

Please look out for one of these forms and follow the instructions provided.

It is important that new electors are not automatically registered to vote even if you add anyone new to your canvass form. Be prepared for the GLA elections on Thursday 2 May 2024

The Mayor of London and London Assembly Elections take place every four years and will take place on Thursday 2 May 2024.

The polls were last held in 2021 after a 12 month delay because of the Covid restrictions.

This means that eligible voters in Tower Hamlets must ensure

they have approved photographic ID with them when they go to the polling station to cast their votes.

The counting system for the Mayor of London, has also changed from a supplementary vote system to a simple majority voting system, known as first past the post.

First past the post means you

vote for one candidate only and the candidate with the most votes will win and become Mayor of London. This method is also used to elect local councillors and members of parliament.

Candidates do not have to secure a certain number of votes - they just win more votes than any other

candidate.

The revised system will also be in place for the election of local authority mayors in England, so will include the borough's next election for the Mayor of Tower Hamlets due to take place alongside the next council elections on Thursday 7 May 2026.



Changes to the borough's parliamentary constituencies

The electoral map of England is being redrawn to reflect population change and that all Parliamentary constituencies contain roughly the same number of electors.

After public consultations led by the Boundary Commission for England (BCE), the final recommendations have now been submitted to Government.

If the changes are agreed, the number of parliamentary constituencies in London will

The electoral map of England is increase from 73 to 75 and will being redrawn to reflect population directly affect Tower Hamlets.

If approved, the new constituencies will be used for the next general election, but any by-elections that may take place before then must use the existing constituencies.

Currently there are two parliamentary constituencies that encompass the entire borough:

- Poplar and Limehouse
- Bethnal Green and Bow.

The new recommendations set out three Parliamentary constituencies in Tower Hamlets: • Poplar and Limehouse

- Bethnal Green and Stepney
- Stratford and Bow.

The new Stratford and Bow constituency will be created by adopting three Tower Hamlets Borough Wards (Bow East, Bow West, and Bromley North) which will be merged with four wards from neighbouring Newham borough (Forest Gate North, Forest Gate South, Green Street & Stratford and New Town).

It will be the responsibility of the Newham Acting Returning Officer to administer this new constituency and not Tower Hamlets.





Instisar, 13, added: "Six weeks is a long time to have nothing to do so clubs like this are amazing. You get to make new friends and I like being creative so was able to draw and make bracelets."

Volunteer Rougie Khanom, a talented basketball player who has founded a basketball team in the borough to encourage more women to play, said: "It is so important to get children active from a young age so they develop good lifelong habits.

"So many parents dread the summer holidays as they don't know how they will keep their youngsters busy and feel guilty if they are left to watch TV and not play outside.

"That's why the HAF scheme is so important as it gives children a safe place to play, socialise and learn new skills. I am keen to get more young girls into sport and would love to see girls take up basketball."

Can I recycle this plastic?

CLEAN AND GREEN

Residents are being reminded what types of plastic they can and can't recycle as part of a new campaign.

The council's campaign, Let's Rethink It, aims to improve the recycling rate across Tower Hamlets.

Currently, the recycling rate is just below 18 per cent - far below the average recycling rate of around 27 per cent for inner London boroughs.

Recycling means we don't need to get new raw materials from the earth, decreasing forestry and mining.

It also reduces the amount of waste and reduces the amount of carbon dioxide released into the atmosphere, which is damaging to the planet.

You can recycle bottles and caps, such as shampoo bottles, pots such as yoghurt pots, fruit punnets, and tubs such as for butter and ice cream. Make sure items and empty and give them a rinse before putting in the recycling.

You can't recycle film from pots or trays, crisp or sweet wrapers, polystyrene or carrier bags and wrapping film. These items need to go into your household waste.

'Standing up for equality'

HISTORY

Standing up for fairness and social justice is part of the fabric of the history of the East End, extending back to and beyond the matchgirl and Dockworkers strikes of the 1880s.

1921 saw the actions of Poplar Borough Council hit the headlines in what has become known today as the Poplar Rates Rebellion.

As Pippa Catterall, Professor of History and Policy at the University of Westminster, explains: "At the time, poverty in Poplar was rife.

"Just 2.5 per cent of the population was deemed middle class and there were high rates of unemployment and overcrowding.

"Poplar had a population of 162,000, which is not much smaller than the whole of Tower Hamlets now."

The political landscape was also different, with Poplar having its own borough council rather than being part of Tower Hamlets. The Greater London Authority also didn't exist, but instead there was the London County Council (LCC).

Councillors on Poplar Borough Council became frustrated by an unfair system of rates, a forerunner of council tax.

In particular, the poorest borough in the capital objected to paying much more than its fair share towards London-wide bodies like the LCC.

In response, the Poplar councillors decided not to levy or pay the precept, the Londonwide element of the rates. Thirty councillors, including six women, were sent to prison indefinitely for contempt of court for refusing a court order to pay the money.

Pippa continues: "There was a lot of support for the councillors. There is a famous photograph of one of them, Minnie Lansbury, with a suitcase and cheering crowds as she is taken to prison.

"The councillors started holding council meetings in Brixton Prison, taking the women over from Holloway Prison where they were being held.

"People had signs in their windows supporting the councillors, and they would sing to them through the prison windows to show their support.

"It looked ridiculous and was embarrassing for the county council. Stepney Borough Council was also considering following in Poplar's footsteps.

"The only way the LCC could get a resolution was to back down over this issue.

"After six weeks, the councillors were released, and an Irish band marched them home with pipes and drums playing."

A new law was also brought in

to make the system of rates fairer for poorer boroughs. However, as Pippa says, the impact of the rebellion is far wider than that.

She explains: "The councillors made themselves into martyrs and the LCC and government looked like bullies – it was political theatre at its best. Due to legal changes after this rebellion, councils can no longer take this action and so it does impact how they can fight against inequalities and unfairness in political and tax systems.

"But this was a great example of David and Goliath: standing up for what is right – local people and social justice – and winning against the odds.

"It shows fighting for social justice isn't all about isms and complicated theories, it is about taking the right course of action, and using an appeal to fairness to win the argument and right a wrong."

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





টাওয়ার হ্যামলেটস বারার শিক্ষার্থীরা তাদের এ-লেভেল এবং জিসিএসই তে দারুণ সাফল্য অর্জন করেছে। প্রায় তিন-চতুর্থাংশ (৭০.৫ শতাংশ) শিক্ষার্থী তাদের এ লেভেলে এ* থেকে সি গ্রেড লাভ করে। পরীক্ষার্থীদের প্রায় এক পঞ্চমাংশ (১৮.১ শতাংশ) একটি এ* বা এ গ্রেড পেয়েছে, যা ২০১৯ সালের তুলনায় ১.৬ শতাংশ বেশি।

টাওয়ার হ্যামলেটসে যারা জিসিএসই পরীক্ষা দিয়েছিলো তাদের অর্ধেকেরও বেশি ডিস্টিংশন এবং তার উপরের সকল গ্রেড অর্জন করেছে, যা ইংল্যান্ডের জাতীয় গড় থেকে প্রায় ১৩ শতাংশ পয়েন্ট বেশি।

এবারের জিসিএসই-তে, টাওয়ার হ্যামলেটসের গড় স্কোর ২০১৯ এর গড় স্কোর ৪৯.৮ থেকে ১.৫ পয়েন্ট বেশি। এই উপাত্ত এটাই দেখায় যে মহামারী সত্ত্বেও ফলাফলের ক্ষেত্রে টাওয়ার হ্যামলেটসে উন্নতির ধারা অব্যাহত রয়েছে।
