



## Are your neighbours at risk of being **cuckooed?**

Cuckooing is when people take over a person's home and use the property for some form of exploitation, such as drug dealing, sex work, human trafficking, storing weapons or financial abuse.

## Signs of cuckooing include:

- Suspicious items in the property, such as weighing scales, multiple phones, sim cards, drug paraphernalia, cash and other valuable items.
- Conversely, the property may appear almost sparse of valuable possessions inside and begin to go into a state of disrepair both inside and out.
- Doors and windows which have been blocked off.
- New faces appearing at the property and the property regularly changing residents.
- Presence of unknown people in the property, who may act as friends of the inhabitant.
- More people than normal entering the property, or people arriving and leaving at unusual times.
- Possible increase in anti-social behaviour in and around the property and increased litter such as drinks cans and takeaway packaging outside the property.
- Cars arriving at the property for short periods of time.
- Signs of drug use and open drug dealing.
